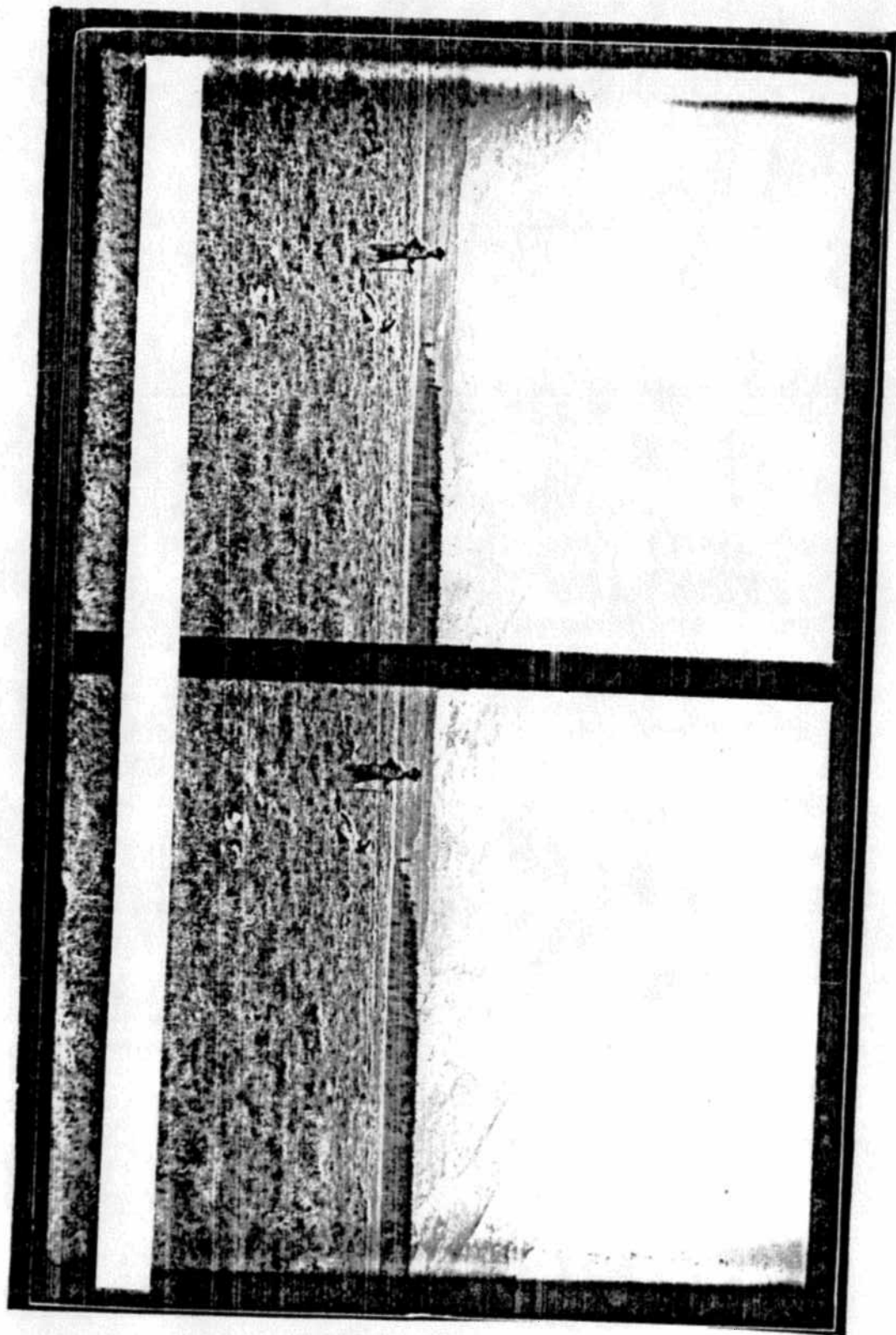

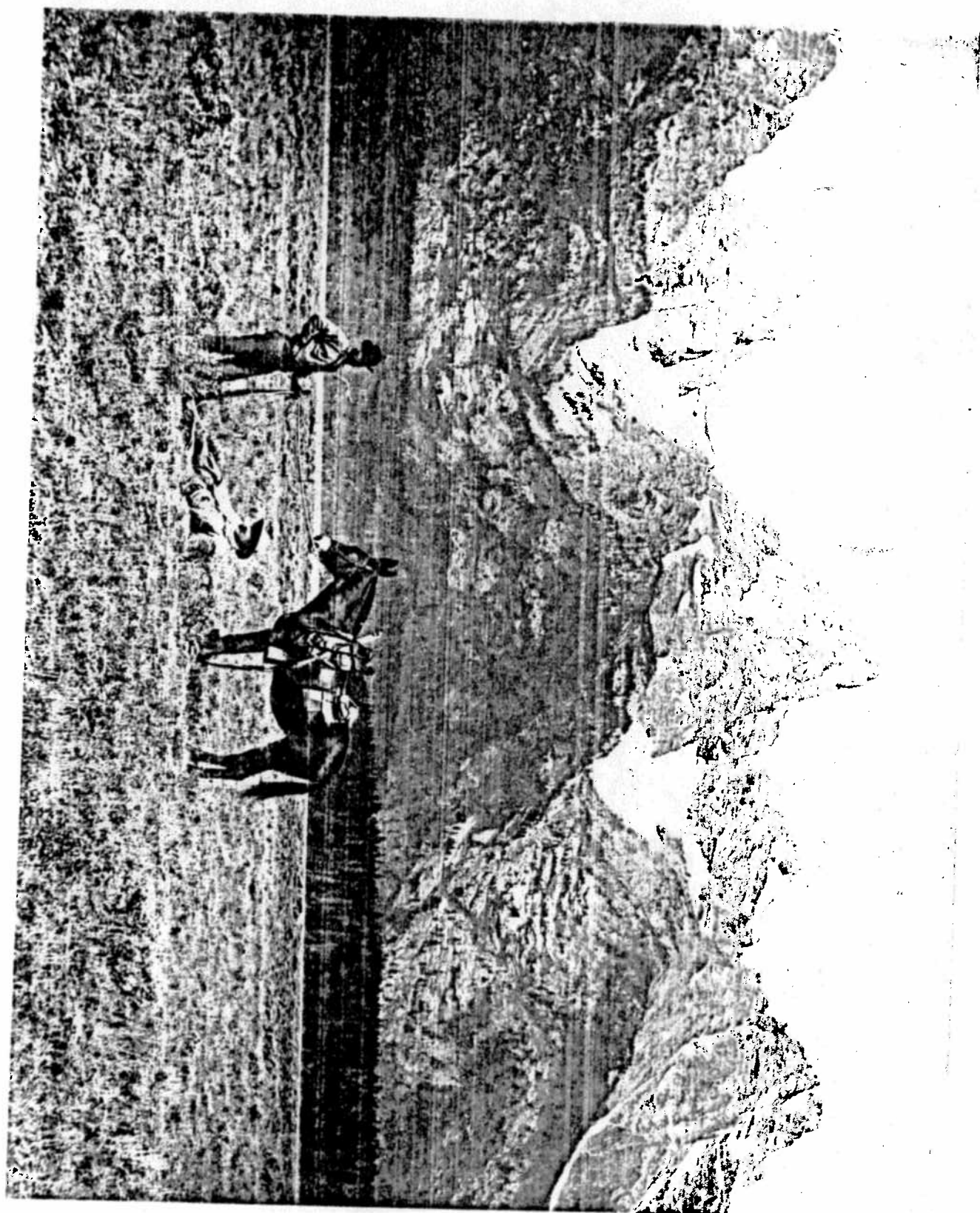

Dear Lewis:

Thank you for your letter of 18 February. I have just returned from Egypt, and your letter was a pleasant surprise.

Yes. Dick Branum and I are working on a book devoted to the Trapdoor Springfield. So are at least two other people we know of, but we hope ours will be the most complete and comprehensive, even though it may not be the first off the press at the rate we are going.

Glad to hear that you acquired the 1881 marked variation of the Officer's Model. I would very much like to include the data on it in our research file and enclose another set of data forms. We really appreciate this information and will, of course acknowledge you in our publications in which we use your data.

You mentioned that you could provide photographs. These would be most helpful, especially tight photos of the lock sides between and including the two rear sights (barrel and tang) taken with the breechblock open. One overall photo of each piece would also be useful.

On your Officer's Rifle #1 you show 47 on the receiver sketch (bottom view) but indicate on my data card that both the barrel and receiver are so marked. Is this correct? (#1 is the one with the dbl. set triggers)

ON #2 (Mkd. 7 inside guard bow) you indicate 55 on the bottom of the barrel but not on the receiver. Is this correct?

For #3 (Mkd. 226 inside guard bow) you indicate that the bottom of the barrel is marked 55 on the data card but do not show it on the sketch. Which is correct?

On #4 (Mkd. 22 inside guard bow) you indicate that the VP eagle head and P are on the right side of the barrel. Don't you mean left? Same for #5.

For #5 you show B-16 inside of the trigger guard bow and D-16 on the inside of the guard plate on one sheet. On another sheet you show a blank space for guard bow marks and B-16 for guard plate marks. Which are correct?

For the rear sights (bbl) of #1 you indicate the numbers 1, 2, 3, 4 on the right side. For #2 you indicate these numbers are on the left side. If this is correct on your piece it is the second time I have heard of the early 1873 rear barrel sight being marked on the left side. The other example I know of is an Officer's Model, but it also has a 50 before the 1 indicating the fifty yard position. Do either of yours also have this 50 before the other numbers? It is sometimes hard to see.

I would like very much to have the complete history on the Officer's Rifle that belonged to the paymaster at Ft. Buford. What was his name? Same for the 2nd Cav. carbine.



Howdy Lew,

On the other side, is my rendition of the round base vernier tang sight for the Officer's Model (1875) Springfield. Like the rifle, the base is in excellent condition. Vance Haynes thinks the staff for the sight was a modified Sharp's sight, and that the staff had a spring loaded plunger that slipped into the 1/4" hole in the base, thus securing the staff in an up-right position. I was hoping that perhaps one of your models had the same sight, if so, could you get measurements or photo's to me so that I can have a staff made? Also, Vance Haynes didn't know what the graduations (range) were on the staff as he does not have an Officer's Springfield with that particular sight on it.

I got in touch with Tom Axtell in Sheridan, Montana....he will make custom sights to order, but of course, has to have the specifications and preferably some photographs along with the spec's. Also, I have a friend in Cheyenne (Tiny McRady) who is a super gunsmith, and Tiny says he can modify a staff from a Sharp's sight if he has the Spec's to do so. Tiny probably has more understanding, more insight, involving the mechanics of firearms of anyone since John Browning, and, he has the equipment/machinery to do the job as well as the ability to do the job. I asked him why he never went to work for Winchester, Colt, or some fire-arm manufacturer....he said he would go to work for them, if they built a plant in Cheyenne !



Howdy Lew,

Enclosed is copy of voucher from Wyoming State archives & museum. Back in those days, I was good friends with Archives director, Neal Miller. Whenever I came across some item in my collecting ventures that Neal wanted for the museum, I let them have it for what I paid for the item. As a result, a lot of good good guns and other things went into the museum from my collection. I had 26 different variations military saddles, all of which went into the Wyoming museum, I don't think any of those saddles are there now. About 4 years ago when in Cheyenne, the museum was preparing a display on the calvary, I asked if they were going to display the Officer's model Springfield, they replied that they didn't have an Officer's model Springfield! I put Frank Guroud's (spelling?) colt from Larry Larom's collection in the musuem, it was later stolen and I recovered it for the museum, I don't know if the colt is still there or not. Anyway, the '76 Winchester on the voucher, was authenticated from archives files, as having belonged to Webb Hayes, who was the son of Rutherford Hayes, President of the U.S. The documentation reads that Webb Hayes shot a fine deer at battle lake in Wyoming (1879) and had the mounted head sent to the white house. The reason there was so much documentation, is that in 1879, Webb Hayes, a Dr. Thornburg from N.Y. and one Thomas Edison were on a hunting and fishing trip at Battle Lake in southern Wyoming, the guide was Taylor Pennock, and they were accompanied by a calvary unit from Ft. Fred Steele (Wyoming), commanded by Dr. Thornburg's brother, Major Thornburg. The Major and his escort were called out on an Indian uprising down in Colorado, the Major and a lot of his troop was killed in that uprising, as fate would have it, Major Thornburg's Officer's Model Springfield was left behind (not military issue). I purchased the entire collection of Taylor Pennock's in Saratoga, Wyoming in 1964, there were 42 guns in that collection, many of them historical. Ironically, Neal Miller of the Wyoming States archives had a falling out with a governor's wife and thus lost his job at the state archives and museum, many of the items I let the museum have are no longer there. So much for hindsight. (Thomas Edison was at Battle Lake in 1879 when he discovered the idea for the light bulb)

## Some Words about the Haynes Collection

In 40+ years of collecting and studying Trapdoor Springfield arms and their development, and after collecting most of the standard types, Haynes specialized in collecting and studying the rare and unusual arms. Much of his research gathering involved recording details of arms at gun shows, museums, and in private collections with the generous patience of their owners. In addition to Officer's Model rifles (OMR) and the Officer's Sporting rifles (OSR) that preceded them, Haynes concentrated on the transitional models of 1877 and 1878. He found that three significant modifications were made to the receiver in calendar year 1878. These are first, nose thickness increased by 0.03 inch and the gas escape port deepened and lengthened in the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter (April, May, June) of 1878. These arms have serial numbers in the range of about 77500 to about 91050 and most bear the Master Armorer's cartouche of ESA over 1877. They are designated Model 1877 officially in Ordnance Memoranda No. 22 (1878) even though breech blocks were stamped MODEL 1873. The third modification is the rounding of the seat for the barrel tenon to accommodate barrels with rounded tenons beginning in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of fiscal year 1879 (October, November, and December of Calendar year 1878). The approximate serial range is 91265 to 96270 and most are cartouched ESA over 1878. These are unofficially designated model 1878 by collectors. The high arch cut in the breach block was eliminated during this period but the flat arched block continued to be marked MODEL 1873.

Starting in the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter of 1879 (January, February, and March) the fourth and final modification of the receiver was made by widening it 0.02 inch and rounding the flange recesses under the ears of the hinge. These arms with serial numbers beginning about 96300 are unofficially designated model 1879 by collectors even though the breach blocks were still marked MODEL 1873. The official designation Model 1884 by the Ordnance Department was

conversion of a 2<sup>nd</sup> Allin to carbine. Also in the collection is a civilian, probably Meecham, conversion of a M1873 carbine to a 20 ga shotgun much like the Springfield Forager shotgun but with 30 inch barrel. In 40+ years of collecting Haynes has seen and owned dozens of the M1881 Springfield forager shotguns, but has seen only one of the Meechams. Lot 23886 is it.

Original M1884 ramrod-bayonet rifles are very rare, but Lot 321310 is more so because of an experimental clamping device to secure the gear-driven elevation slide on the rear sight.

In researching and recording details of Springfield Officers Model (OMR) rifles Haynes has defined 8 groupings of significant variations based in part upon the receiver modifications mentioned earlier. Lot \_\_\_\_\_ is an early OMR with a type 1 receiver and falls into his group 3. A few OMRs in this group have the name CLAYTON neatly stamped in the wood under the guard plate. No other OMRs are so marked with the name of the Springfield armorer who did the custom work on OMR stocks. Haynes suspects that once Col. J. G. Benton, Commanding Officer of the National Armory, learned of this he told John H. Clayton to cease and desist. Lot \_\_\_\_\_ falls into Haynes' OMR group 8 which is one of 100 of the last batch of OMRs made in 1885. There are no assembly numbers on these and essentially no variations within the batch.

Haynes also collected and researched the M1870 experimental rifles and carbines manufactured by Springfield Armory for Ordnance Department testing and field trials. These are rare and some saw combat during the 1873 Yellowstone expedition where two companies of the 7<sup>th</sup> Cavalry under the command of G. A. Custer had experimental carbines while several infantry companies had the experimental rifles. Lot \_\_\_\_\_ is a Springfield M1870 carbine and Lots \_\_\_\_\_ and \_\_\_\_\_ are M1870 rifles, the latter with ser. no. 38 probably being one of the very rare trial arms. Lot \_\_\_\_\_ is one of the rare Springfield-Remington M1870 rifles with the sliding extractor and Lot \_\_\_\_\_ is a very rare Springfield-Sharps M1870 rifle. The rare

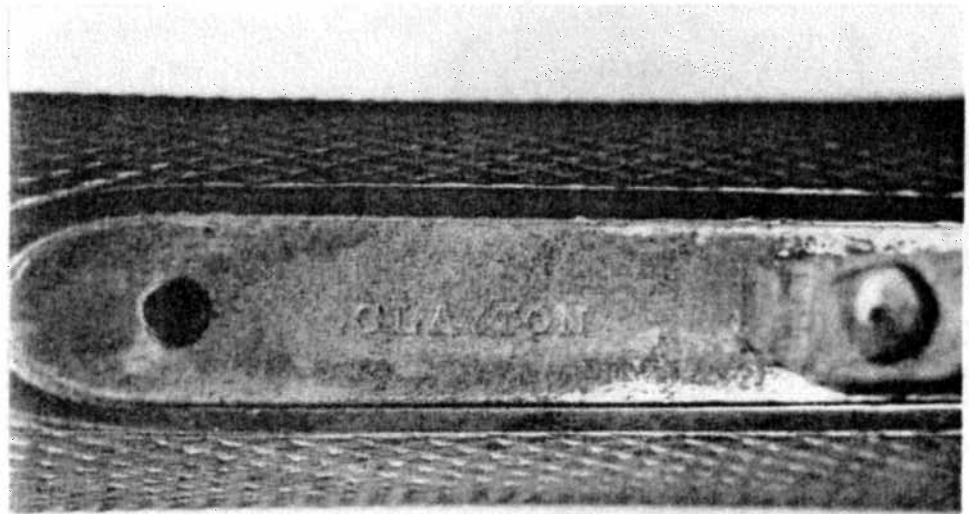
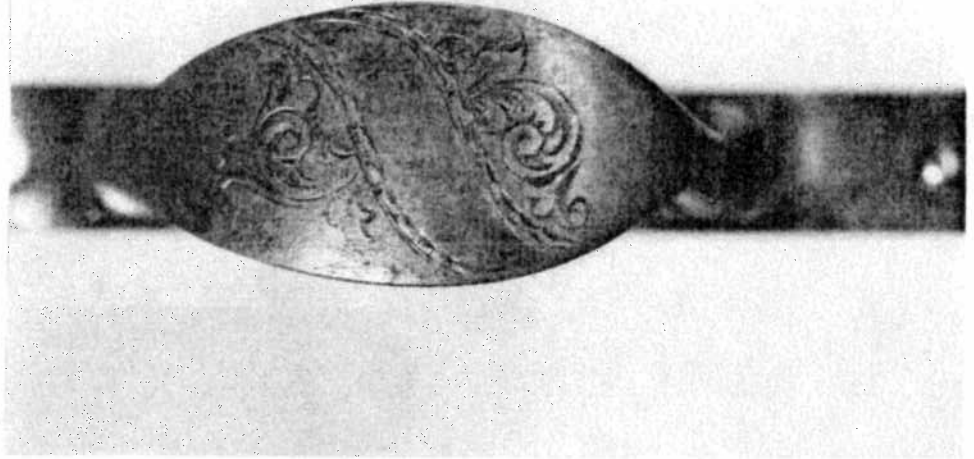
Dear Lew:

Sorry to take so long to reply to your letter of December 27, but I have been swamped now that the spring semester has started.

I appreciate the data on the "Sporting Rifle" no. 8235, and was glad to have your comments on the other rifles. Regarding your early 1873 carbine no. 18719 you said that the comb was standard for the early model and circled "long", but the standard early comb length is shorter than those made after 1876. The best bet is to measure it. It should be about 9 inches as compared with about 10 inches for the later stock. Also, does the band have a stacking swivel?

Never thought that I would be offering you one of my Officer's Models, but I have decided to sell my Model 1875 dated SWP 1885. A description is enclosed. The price to you is \$2,300.00 or \$2,100.00 if you would include your early 1873 carbine, no. 18719. I would also consider some sort of trade for your 28-inch barrel .45-70 model. In any case please let me know right away if you want it so I can start advertising if you don't. I should add that it is the model you apparently do not have and is a very attractive piece. I would not sell it were I not on the track of an even rarer bird.

By the way, you mentioned some errors in Archer Jackson's "book". Do you mean his articles in the bulletin of the American Society of Arms Collectors? If not then let me know the name of the book. If so I would appreciate knowing of the mistakes.

Dear Lewis:

Thank you very much for the completed data forms on your most interesting Officer's Rifles. That is a lot of work getting all of the details down and not many people are willing to go through it. I really appreciate it.

Your early .45-70 with 28 in barrel is intriguing. It really sound like what a .45-70 "sporting" rifle ought to look like, and the best clue as to whether or not Springfield Armory made it may be in the engraving. I enclose three photos showing some of the engraving on two pieces. The early "standard" model was probably in the first batch of production and, therefore, may be similar to your #1. I would love to see some photos of it if you ever get the chance to take some.

Your #2 has a rear sight peep that I have not seen before nor have I seen a tang like the one on #3. These may have been special order. The breechblock with square flanges yet with filled arch like your #3 is what I ~~xxxxx~~ unofficially call the 1877-78 transitional model for obvious reasons. Does the base of the slide on the barrel sight have a notch that is recurved, shallow "V", or semicircular? Same applies to your #4 & 5.

Your #6 is also quite interestin, but it has many features that I doubt are of Springfield origin for no other reason than that all potential Springfield "sporting" rifles that I am familiar with have certain things in common and that do not appear on your 50-70, i.e. U.S. buttplates of cadet width, simple rounded white metal forend with straight back, and checkering at the wrist as on later Officer's Rifles. I could be wrong but the wedge barrel attachment, integral pistol grip, and laminated stock, and thick brass buttplate are not like anything I know of from the National Armory yet are well within the range of variation seen in civilian customizing.

You are indeed fortunate to have all of those Custer era US Colt SAA's. I have # 34026 dated 1876 with the early block letter address and artillery # 11523 (frame) # 8418 (strap and guard). The latter I bought mint from Robert Abels in 1948. he had a dozen or so that he got from England after WWII where they had been sent from the US. It now has holster wear on the muzzle and in places on the cylinder because I foolishly used to carry it in Colorado. Live and learn!

Dear Mr. Yearout:

Please forgive my delay in answering your most interesting letter. You do indeed have some fine Officer's Rifles so I am enclosing data sheets and cards for these. I would appreciate having these filled out when you have time. I also enclose copies of data cards on my specimens.

Your Gun No. 1 is very interesting, and I wonder if it might be a predecessor of the "standard" Officer's Rifle. It is known that Springfield Armory allowed these to be customized by the armorers at their own shops after working hours for extra pay. As a result what are believed to be actual specimens of the "Sporting" rifles show many variations in sights and furniture. These were 50-70's, but it seems logical that there were early 45-70's like this also. Yours may be one. If you ever get a chance to photograph it I would appreciate having a copy.

A few of the earliest Officer's Rifles have the name CLAYTON stamped in the wood under the rear of the trigger-guard plate. He was one of the armorers with whom the Armory contracted for finishing the stocks. Because of the later type breechblock markings on your Nos. 2,3, and 4 I doubt that they will be so stamped, but it would be interesting to see if your No. 1 has it.

I should caution that many of the various trapdoors were sporterized by civilian gunsmiths in the early days, and it may be very difficult if not impossible to tell whether or not some specimens are true Springfield Armory products. The authority on these matters is a gentleman named Archer Jackson who has written two articles in the journal of the American Society of Arms Collectors. It has a very limited circulation so if you have not seen it and would like a copy I'll be happy to have a copy made for you.

No. I'm not apt to sell any of mine in the immediate future, if you decide to let any of yours go please let me know. What condition are they in? Do you have any early US SAA Colt .45's, S&W Americans, Schofields, or trapdoor carbines?

I have an early carbine with a letter stating that it was picked up by a rancher near Slim Buttes. The letter is from a Douglas Vernon, Sioux Falls Trading Post, S.D. I don't put much stock in such claims, but I would like to check it out with the rancher. Trouble is my letters to Vernon come back marked "moved, left no address", so I make it a point to ask anyone up that way if they know of him. Please let me know if you have any leads.

Please forgive my delay in replying to your letter of July 14, 1971, but I only found your letter upon my return from summer geological fieldwork in Arizona.

It is always a pleasure to hear from a fellow "trapdoor" collector, especially one who has Officer's Rifles. The one in my display is what I hope may be an example of what the Ordnance Records refer to as a Sporting Rifle made from the Model 1868 rifle before ~~they~~ Officer's Rifles were produced. I have no proof of this except that a Mr. Archer Jackson who has done the most archival research on the subject believes that these Springfield Sporting Rifles were made from the production models by Armory gunsmiths who were permitted to do the sporterizing at their own home shops, and for extra pay. Because of this custom work it is unlikely that any two will be found alike in all respects, however of the three specimens Jackson feels are genuine, including mine, there are a few similar features such as double set triggers, half stock with white metal cast foretip, coarse checkering on the wrist, and a narrower buttplate.

If interested I would like very much to exchange detailed data with you on this as well as your Officers Rifles. Except for those made in 1885 I have found that there are minor variations in detail between all of the dozen or so Officer's Rifles I have examined.

Thanks for writing, and I look forward to hearing from you again.

Thank you very much for your letter of 30 April and all eight of the completed data forms. That was a time consuming effort, and I appreciate your help.

I will talk to Dick about an autographed copy of our book when it comes out. You have been most cooperative and have provided more data than most. For these reasons I favor your request and am certain that Dick will too. We, of course, cannot do this for everyone that helps for obvious reasons. For the same reasons we can only acknowledge specific specimens when they are specifically discussed or illustrated and then only by stating "From the collection of \_\_\_\_\_" when the owner so desires.

In regard to photos of your specimens please do not go to a lot of trouble because there is no guarantee that we will make use of the photos in the book. Most of the photography that we will actually use is what we take in my specially equipped room. We are striving for uniformity and a minimum of background shadows. If, on the other hand, we do use one of your photos we will acknowledge it as such.

As for the timing of the photographs keep in mind the fact that Officer's Rifles will be covered in the second volume of our work along with experimental arms and those of limited production.

Regarding your O.R. #2, are the range numbers on the rear sight base really on the left side? Is there also a 50 before the 1? Please check once more.

I do not have the length of the forearm from the band shoulder to the end for O.R. #4 nor the maximum width of the buttplate of this same piece. The same goes for the forearm of O.R. #5.

Is there really a 3-notch tumbler in your sporterized M1868 ser. no. 11750? If so how was it constructed as compared to a standard '68 tumbler?

For your O.R. #7 (1881 marked) I need to know the following:

Buttplate: trap or plain  
Buttplate width: wide or narrow      Mks. outside  
Bands mkd: (large, medium or small U)  
Front sight:  
Tumbler: 2 or 3 notch

By the way, by camlatch rivet I mean the characteristic of the end of the camlatch shaft where it comes through the thumbblatch. Before 1886 the riveting marks were ground off leaving a flat surface. All Officer's Rifles should be this way if they followed the book, which we know sometimes they didn't.


The shield in the eagle on lockplates is either large or small, and this is what I meant to be stated after lockplate on my data card.

Your smooth bore ser. no. 478944 is probably a civilian modification because the Army would not allow such and similar arms appeared in catalogs of surplus arms such as Meecham, etc. I would like to have data on your Forager ser. no. 439 and on your early carbine, ser. no. 36073, that belonged to Wm. Strong, 2nd Cav. Blank data sheets enclosed along with some more for Officer's Rifles.

You certainly have a fine collection of Sporting rifles and Officer's Rifles. Nos. 3, 4, 5, & 8 appear to have been made during the transition period of 1877, but the one I am most intrigued by is #1. I am puzzled by the lack of normal markings on the breechblock and lockplate, and am anxious to see photos of the engraving, checkering and tang sight.

Sorry it has taken me so long to get to your last letter---but there just seems not enough hours in any day or any week.

Anyway as per your letter, I went back over the specific questions you ask and find that I did make some errors, and left some info out, not intentionally. Hoping the below will assist in both areas.

On B.B. No. 2.

- A.- The Range numbers are on the Right Side of the sight---If I said Left I was in error.
- B.- There is not a 50 in front of the I on the side of the sight.

On O.R. No.4.

- A.- The length of the forearm from band shoulder to the end is 3 and 54/64 inches.

On O.R. No.5.

- A.- The length of the forearm from band shoulder to the end ~~is also 3 and 54/64th.~~ is also 3 and 54/64th.

On the I868 Serial no. II750

- A.-This is a 2 notch tumbler (not a three).

On O.R. No.7.

- A.-Buttplate does not have a trap.
- B. Large U on the band.

All of the camlatch Rivets are ground off on all my Officers Models. Except the I868 serial no II750 and also this applies to O.R. No. 8. which is not ground off. Both of the above are engraved on the full surfaces of the camlatch. All others O.R. are plain un-engraved. All Eagles on all lockplates are large. All measure wing tip to wing tip of 25/32 inch. except there is no eagle on O.R. that was not made for ~~xx~~ a ramrod ---believe that on the Forms that is O.R. no. I.

Also on the Carbines---also have two more early Carbines-- -Serial no. 2065 and ~~XX~~ I8719 They are identical in data to no. 36073, but they do have short comb stocks.

The Forager type Carbine I mentioned to you is an interesting item---Serial no. 478944. Long carbine stock comb with 1884 breech block. 22 inch barrel . Front sight is a brass bead, and would swear there has been no other sight on the gun except this brass ~~XXXX~~ type bead. Not screwed in ---straight type pin inserted into barrel 18/32 from end of muzzle. No rear sight but holes are there where original was at one time. Bore smooth Bore, no rifling. Small eagle and 2 line lock, no date. Wide buttplate without trap. trigger ~~XXXX~~ grooved. hammer knurled. Small U.S. on buttplate. Large \$X 45 stamped in comb of stock in front of Buttplate.

If you do not plan on using the pictures of the Officers Models, then I will not go to the expense of taking them. But if there are any you want let me know and will take them They will be professional if taken. Any size you want.

Data sheets on Forager # 439 and Carbine # 36073 inclosed.

I have an affidavit and am completing the History on 36073 as dictated by a man of 90 Years of age, but am being held back by data coming from the National Archives which I need for verification. But in short here is the data:

"William Strong was born Jan. 20, 1845 in Devonshire, England, Son of a farmer and well educated. He migrated to the U.S. and enlisted Jan 1, 1868 at Cincinnati Ohio. Sworn in by Capt. William O'Connell Sent to Camp Carlisle ~~Pa~~ Penn. Then assigned to Fort McPherson, Nebraska to Company I, 2nd U. S. Cavalry. Then To Fort Russell and then to Fort Laramie in Wyoming. He Remained in Wyoming and was assigned to General Crooks 1876 Campaign. He had continuous service thru 3 continuous enlistments and ask to get out of the service at Fort Keough (under General Miles on Oct. 26 1880. All of his service was with Company I, 2nd U.S. Cavalry. He was issued the carbine and carried it from the day it is issued to him then the Company first was issued 73 Model Carbines. He broke the stock and it was broke after his discharge at Fort Keough Montana Territ. He replaced the stock out of Fort Keough as he then worked there for some time as a Civilian Barber before he went into cattle ranching in the Fort Keough area where he lived and died ---Died in Feb. 26, 1926. Before his death he gave the Carbine to his Son in Law and I purchased it direct from the Son In Law. He gave me the history including the carrying of the Carbine all thru General Crooks campaign. If you look up the Book entitled "With Crook at the Rosebud" by J.W. Vaughn---On page 212 is a list of Company I, 2nd Cav. Members. I have copies from the archives of all of his service and the story is 100 % so far, but I am checking another area before I put it all back in correct order form. To my knowledge this is the first and only U.S. Model 1873 Carbine that can reflect an issue to a specific Trooper where the history is proven by notarized statement.

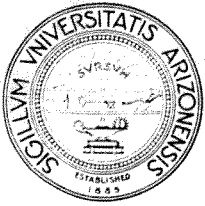

Card No.I634 describes one of the earliest Sporting rifles(Officers Special Ord built on a Springfield Model I869 (Breech block) Serial no. II750, Cal..50-70 Go Spare parts and cleaning items in a compartment under buttplate. Stock construct from 3 separate parts of Musket stocks laminated together.

Card No.I348 describes one of the earliest Sporting rifles (Officers Special ord built on an early Springfield Model I873 action. Serial no. has been removed prior to or in construction of the rifle, a system which followed into the standardized Model I875 Officers Model. Caliber is .45-70 -Longer barrel of 28 $\frac{1}{4}$  inches and no provision for a ram rod. Double set adjustable trigger assembly, probably built some time in the early I870 period. The Springfield records reflect that a known quantity of 23 such special individually designed rifles were made in cal. of .45-70 and .50-70 between Jan I870 and June I875. The Officer Model of I875 was standardized by design June 30,or July I,I875. This gun has no serial no. yet the No.47 is stamped inside the breech block. The known history of this gun-Mrs Mabel Bowen of 2nd Ave. No. Great Falls, had this gun with her late husbands gun coll. in her basement, when she ask me to inventory and value each and put them into two separate groups. One group was to be left to her daughter and the second group to her son William Bwen a local G.F. Policeman resideing at I504-2nd ave. South Great Falls, Mont. This would have been in I958 or I959. Her story on the rifle above, her late husband had been a Real Estate salesman and one who also loaned money on guns. This gun had a tag marked \$ I.OO.(one dollar) The gun was reputed as having been the original gun of a U.S.Army Officer -name unknown at that date. The gun was finally acquired from William Bwen Jan.29,I970.

After standarization of such rifles into the designation Officers Model I875 in May I875 only a total of 477 such rifles were ever made.

number information on the Springfield 20-gauge shotgun will be found in Chapter 9.

A comment or two may be helpful on the manufacturing record table included in this chapter. First of all, data in the table are based on the calendar year, broken down into four three-month quarters. The number of arms of each model manufactured during each quarter is given in appropriate spaces, and the estimated highest serial number for each quarter is given in the column at the far right of the table. From the right-hand column one can determine the total number of arms manufactured up to the end of each quarter. Similarly, the table provides data on total production of arms up to the ends of both calendar and fiscal years. Simple arithmetic will give the number of arms manufactured during any fiscal or calendar year, and the totals for any category of arm are given on the bottom line of the table. The sum of these totals is necessarily in agreement with the highest estimated serial number in the table.

"THE SPRINGFIELD RIFLE, OFFERS MODEL - 1875"

A special Rifle for sale only to Military Officers of the Armed Forces of the United States.

The exact "how" and "why" of the origination of this special made Rifle is not really known today.

We can reconstruct the main theory:

During the Civil War and even before, it had become a good "token of appreciation" for an Arms Manufacturing concern attempting to sell its products to the Government to engrave and embellish one or more of their examples of production and present them to well known political or military personages in the higher echelon of Government. It greatly eased the trials and tribulations of obtaining Government contracts. The Smith Carbine Serial No. O. depicted in this display is one such example. The Sharps Carbine Model 1851 depicted here is another such example.

Not every officer received such favors. Those that did not took the other path of obtaining "embellished" firearms--they purchased them. This led to individual officers, especially those serving on the "Western Frontier", who desired something a little special, to procure such by many means. Springfield Arsenal workmen, on their own time, made such rifles by special individual request and design. The first were produced in 50-70 caliber. One such gun is depicted here in that caliber. It is made of three distinct musket stocks laminated together. Either the originator or the maker was of British extraction. The stock was pistol gripped and the checking is raised above the wood outline.

The first "Officer Models" even in the 45-70 caliber (after 1873) were individually designed rifles. Note the example in this display which has a double trigger assembly, extra long barrel and no place for a ramrod. It is today not known just how many of these early individually designed "Officers Models" were made. Very few exist, in fact we know of only one besides the two displayed here. They are very scarce, perhaps a better word is "rare".

In 1875 this special work of building special rifles was eliminated by the Commander of Springfield Arsenal. He took the best designs and the best ideas and created a "Standard Officers Model Rifle". It was put into production and it was made available on special order. It could be purchased for Twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) and in August, 1875 the price was increased to Thirty-six dollars (\$36.00).

As listed hereon you see the exact description of this rifle as it was made and stocked for sale to any officer of the Military Forces who desired such a Rifle.

The Military Officer strength of the entire Army in 1875 was not a large Force. From General to 2nd Lt. and Chaplain, there were only 2,151 individuals. By 1898 there were only 2,137.

This was not a great market, yet it does contrast with the known production of standardized Officer Model Rifles made and recorded

by the Springfield Armory as noted below:

Thusly, at the extreme, we find perhaps a total of 505. Most authorities quote a lesser figure of 477. Whichever figure should be correct, only reflects their scarcity.

Now, one hundred years later, we have attempted to reassemble as many of them in one group as possible. We have eleven in this group. They cover the production from the earliest known in caliber of 50-70 to those made in the last years of production in the mid 1880's.

All early "standardized" models reflect the high arch breech block. "Sharps Rifle Company" rear Tang sights are found through all early production and are reflected in this exhibit.

Detachable pistol grips became available in April, 1877. But they could, as they are "detachable", be found on any early or late model, as any owner could install it if desired. "Transition Versions" with a change in rear barrel sights reflect vintage of 1878-1880.

The 50 rifles made in 1881 were a separate group with the date "1881" stamped on top of the action back of the hammer. The last group of 100 reflect Inspector stamps on the wood. There are no serial numbers assigned to any of these rifles. But a close inspection of all parts reflect the exact workman in the Armory who made each gun. He also assigned a "Work Number" to each gun. That number is stamped inside the trigger guard of each gun.

We take no credit for any of these items, or any of the information printed hereon. It all is just a small portion of our American History of those years. Much of the history concerning these fine well made tools of our early frontier, is either lost, misplaced or not yet found.

In this Exhibit we have made an attempt to bring them to your attention. In doing so perhaps a few more of them will be brought to light. They deserve preservation. If you know of any such items, please take the time to drop us a note. We would like to learn more about them. To do so requires the cooperation of you, the general American public.

Your letter of Aug. 26, 2002. On your answers you ask for::

Gun (yearout No. 2)-Front sight measurement - I and 1/8 in.

Yearout No. 3)-Thimble is the same as on your form for gun No. 8.

Yearout No. 7)-Item No. 26 is I and 1/8 in.

Yearout No. 8)-Item No. 7I is NO.

The no. on the wrist is either 96 or 86 -with the 6 plain or legible, but the 9 or 8 is one or the other.

This gun is by the way from Fort Buford originally and with a letter from the family stating the former owner as the Paymaster, his grandfather who was killed outside the Fort. The family being named Strachan. And the letter covers the Buffalo Hide Indian type scabbard that you looked at here. In fact while you had a Dallas Texas address I sent you a picture of Mr Strachan (from whom the rifle came at Wolf Point) where he lived. The picture is of him and several others salvaging the Machinery off a sunk vessel in the Missouri River and the Vessel was named "Victoria". in the vicinity of Fort Buford No. Dak.

I also displayed a group of Officers Models at the N.R.A. Convention (107th Annual Meeting) held at the Salt Lake City Utah April 16-1978. Winning a "Certificate of Recognition" for the overall Display. Plus a Silver Award No. ~~106~~ as "One of the ten Best Weapons Displayed for the gun You call Gun No. I. I76

Display was under the banner of the "MONTANA ARMS COLLECTORS ASSOC.".

As such gun Award no. I76 is sterling Silver and will always be pictured and known as No. I76 in their overall Award listings by number and date, as they normally select the best IO of each show.

With the picture as noted above I also in the same letter to you at Dallas included a Notarized copy of the Guns written history including the Buffalo Hide sheath or scabbard. If you need another copy I can always send another.

I appreciate the copy of your book on the Custer rifle. In the back of my mind I believe the gun was sold at a Calif. Auction - -but I fail to find the data, could you direct me to the specific Auction and date.?

And if I may be of further assistance, close as your mailbox.

By the way - - Did you not also take the data on the rifle that formerly belonged to Don Nichols of Tucson. I sold it for him last year and bought it back from that sale, as I in buying it back thought it should be retained. It is with No. II on the wood wrist and I5 and A inside the Guard bow. Or you may have taken the data when Don had the gun.

Many thanks for a rewarding visit to your home 15 August. Thanks also for your book "Winchester's North West Mounted Police Carbines." It is a fine work. A signed copy of my book on Custer and his sporting rifles is on its way under separate cover.

Enclosed are copies of my data sheets for your files. These really update my records on Springfield OMRs and OSRs.

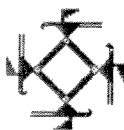
Regarding Yearout #2 with 9 on the wrist, 7 in the guard bow and 55 under barrel, I must have misread my tape rule when measuring the distance from the center line of the front sight to the muzzle as 3 1/8 inches. It must be 1 1/8 inch. Please confirm when you get a chance. By the way, Yearout #2 fits my Group 4 OMRs with round-base sight, so the round hole under the anomalous tang sight is for the Springfield round base. The only other anomalous part is the thimble with beaded or raised edges.

Yearout #3 with 61 or 64 on wrist and 26 in guard bow fits my Group 6a, i.e. round barrel tenon, square flange recess, and oval-base tang sight. Group 6a has the 1877 rear barrel sight while 6bs have the 1879 barrel sights. Yours has the 1877 ramp with an 1879 type II ladder. The front tip of the cleaning rod was missing according to earlier correspondence. I did not record the style of thimble, but believe it is atypical, like the one on Yearout #2. Please check.

Yearout #4 with 17 on wrist and 22 in guard bow is also in my Group 6a with 1877 rear sight with smooth ramp.

Yearout #5 with 43 on wrist and 16 in the guard bow is also in Group 6 but with the 1879 rear barrel sight which makes it a 6b. This is one I first examined at Red Jackson's store in August 1970, apparently before you acquired it although Red said it was consigned from someone in Montana. I last saw it at the Denver show in May 1998.

I have no data on Yearout #6 so it must be one you had briefly.



Yearout #7 with 7 on the comb and 20 in the guard bow is in my Group 7, distinguished by the 1881 date on receiver and in the SWP cartouche. Once again I misrecorded the distance in item 26. Please remeasure when you have a chance.

Yearout #8, with 96 or 86 on the wrist and 24 in the guard bow, is another in Group 6b. I could not, for the life of me, see a number on the wrist, only stains. Maybe I needed better light. Anyhow, I failed to record for item 71 the type of butt plate, i.e. Civil War type filed down to cadet width, 1873 type with bolster around interior of the lower screw hole, or latest type with more solid, filled in, interior with raised rim.

Thanks again for your help and extend my regards to Teddie with my apologies for staying so late.

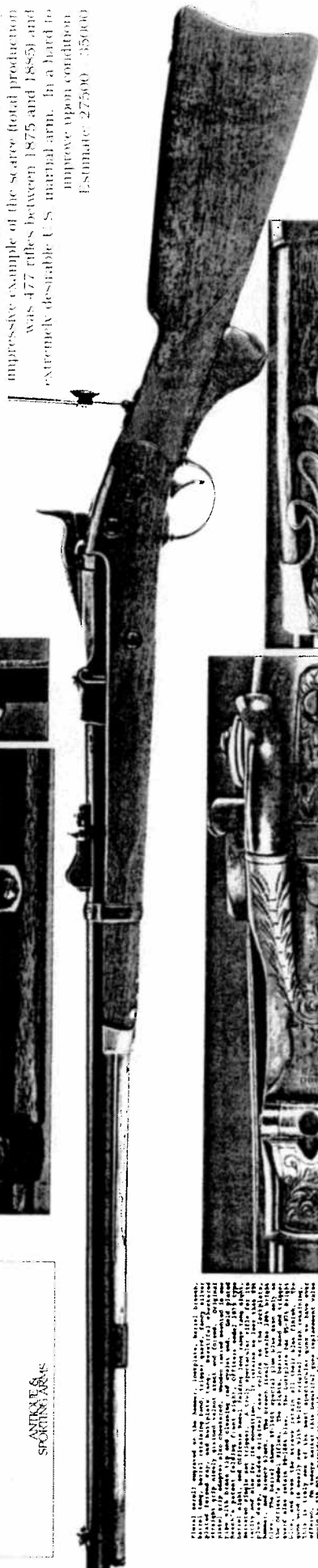
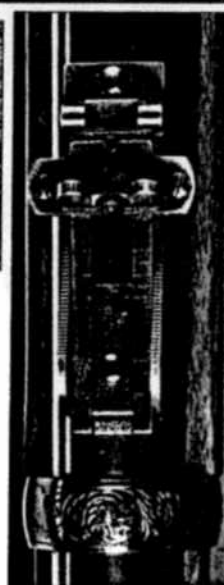
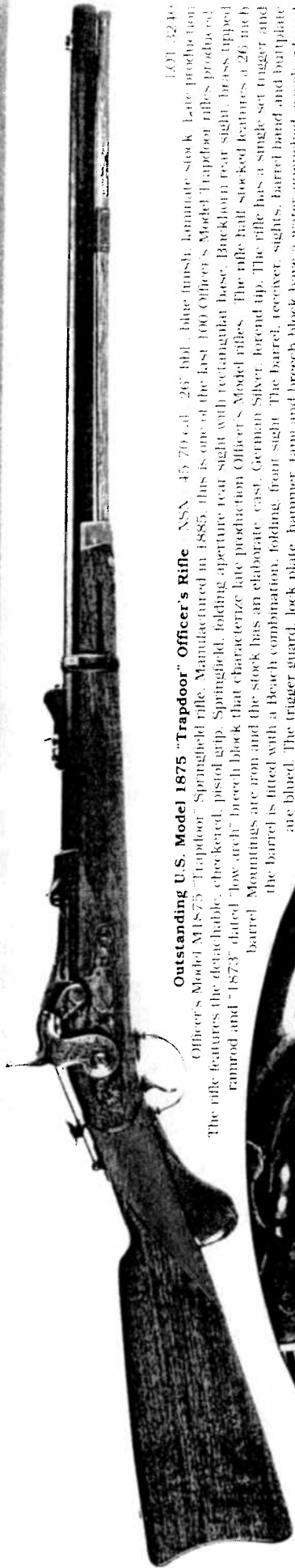

It has been a long time since we corresponded. I am finally getting my Officer's Model data together. The two books on "Trapdoors" (Frasca and Hill & Wait<sup>e</sup> and Ernst) kind of knocked the wind out of our sails considering we had about 25 years of similar data ready for our book.

There still needs to be more said about Springfield Sporting rifles and Officer's Models, so I'm trying to bring my data all together having examined about 80 specimens. I want to include data on your rifles but there are some data I'm not sure of and need clarification. In discussing these I will go back to our previous procedure, Yearout number, but to be sure we are talking about the same piece I'll state the trigger guard bow number and the number in the stock wood behind the barrel tang as follows:

Yearout #2, bow 7, stock 9 - I have the breechblock listed as having the high arch as opposed to the flat, filled arch. Is the barrel tenon round or square and is the step angle at the rear end of the long gas port low or high (steep)? See attached sheet explaining these features.

Yearout #3, bow 226, stock 61 or 64 - Is the number in the bow really 226 or is 26 with an odd 2 off to the side? If it is 226 it is the first I've heard of over 100. What is the set-trigger spring like, bent flatspring or heavier machined type? I see from your letters that it must not be possible to tell if the stock number is 61 or 64. Is the barrel tenon round or square and is the gas port step angle high or low? *very high & almost straight up*

# SPRINGFIELD RIFLE,

OFFICER'S MODEL, 1875.



## DESCRIPTION.

The weight of this Rifle is about 8 lbs., varying with the density of the wood used in the stock.

The length of the barrel is 26 inches.

The stock is checked "fore and aft" the breech, and is tipped with white metal.

The Rifle has a plain "buckhorn" sight on the barrel, graduated like the service sight, and also has peep and globe sights. The globe sight can be folded down on the barrel, when its pin becomes an open front sight, to be used with the buckhorn sight. The peep has a lateral as well as a vertical motion, and by turning the screw and loosening it, may be adjusted to counteract any deviation to the right or left. When at the bottom of the slide, the peep is adjusted for a range of 50 yards; when at the top, it is adjusted for a range a little less than 700 yards. The peep sight may be folded down on the barrel either forward or backward. In the former position, the peep should be pushed to the bottom of the slide, or the hammer, in being cocked, will strike it.

The globe sight is distant from the buckhorn and peep sights 20.8 inches and 32.75 inches respectively.

The Rifle has a "single set" trigger. When *set*, it is a hair trigger; when *unset*, it is the ordinary service trigger, requiring a pull of about four pounds. The trigger should be set by pushing it forward with the thumb, *after cocking the hammer—never before*. A "fly" in the tumbler carries the sear over the half-cock notch when the trigger is set.

The ramrod is of wood, both ends being fernled with brass, nickel-plated. The ferule on the smaller end has a slot for the admission of a wiping-rag; that on the larger end has a milled head for convenience in drawing out the rod. A small pin in the under side of the barrel entering a hole in the rod just below this milled head, prevents the rod from slipping out of place.

The breech-block, receiver, hammer, lock, band, and the heel of the butt plate are all plainly engraved.

The cost of the Rifle is \$36.

The description and dimensions of the parts of the Rifle, other than those above mentioned, are the same as of the corresponding parts of the Springfield Rifle, calibre .45".
