

Powerwise, the only comparable lightweight carbine I know of is the old Mannlicher-Schoenauer 9.5 with 270-grain bullet of lower velocity. With the coarse iron sights it's very hard to make small groups, and the 2X Redfield was needed for fine grouping, but the coarse open sights would be ample for close-range bear-stopping or finishing off wounded game. It is not nor ever was intended to be a long-range rifle, but is fast becoming very popular with the big-game guides.

For those guides, fishermen, or cowpokes who won't or cannot shoot a heavy .44 Magnum sixgun, this little .350 Remington Magnum carbine may well be the answer. For those who prefer the light weight and minimal bulk of iron sights, yet want a longer sight radius, the little gun is tapped for and can be fitted with the excellent Williams Fool Proof receiver sight, and the open rear sight can be removed. Make no mistake, it is a potent little package. Wayne Leek, of Remington, is the man responsible for this load.

### JUDGE DON MARTIN CAN STILL SHOOT!

Judge Don Martin, who wrote the two best articles I have seen on antigun legislation is now around 70 years young. He was down on the Mexican border chasing Pancho Villa with Pershing before World War I; he was overseas in France, in the heavy field artillery, through our part of World War I; he served three terms as Sheriff of Lemhi County, Idaho, then seven

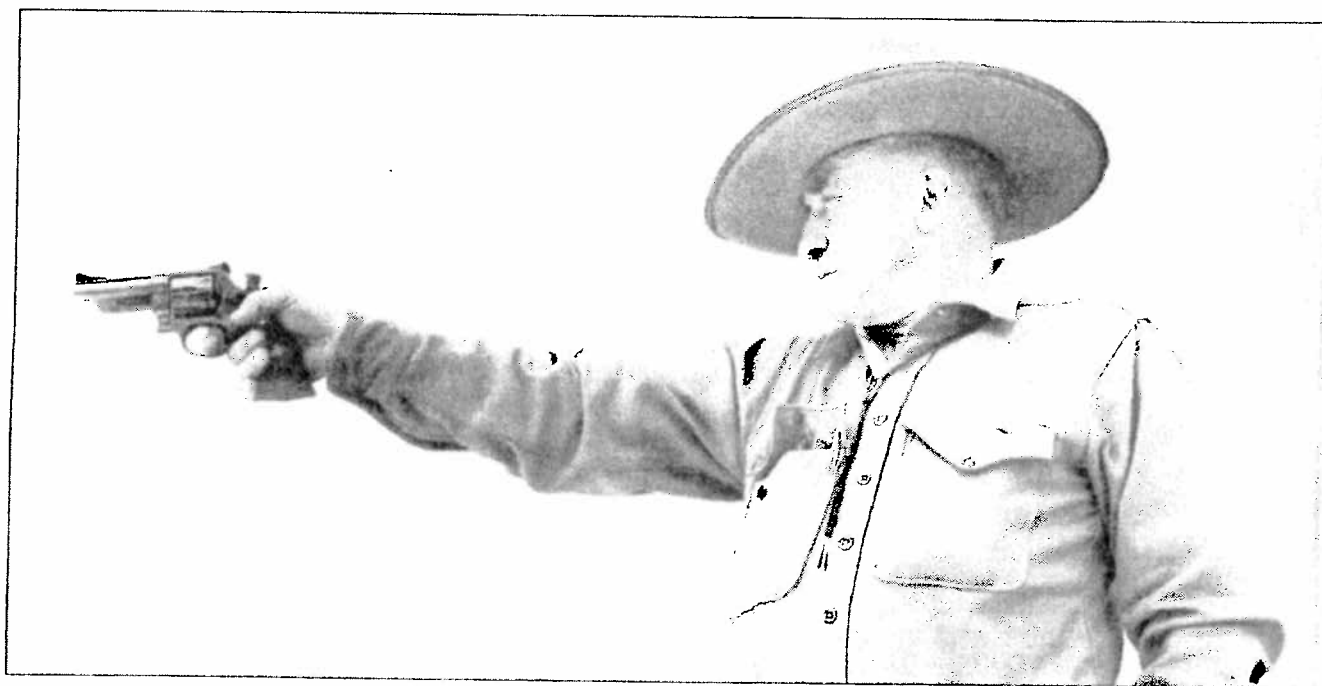
years as Deputy U.S. Marshal in Alaska; and following that, he was Probate Judge of this county. The soldier has been one of my closest friends 1023 years. We have hunted together, shot together, tested guns and ammunition together at every opportunity during this time. He did the first reading of the last five books I have had published.

He can still shoot, either rifle or sixgun, and on the 29th of June he fired a five-shot, 1 1/2-inch group at 50 feet with World War I .45 Auto ammunition dated 1918. Pat Garrett always claimed that anyone who could put four out of five shots under a silver dollar offhand with a .45 was "shooting some," so this group with my old accurized Model 1911A1 .45 auto well proves the accuracy of this ancient ammunition. It also proves the Judge can still shoot. We need more men in America like Don Martin.

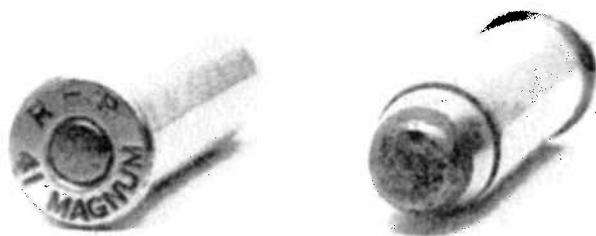

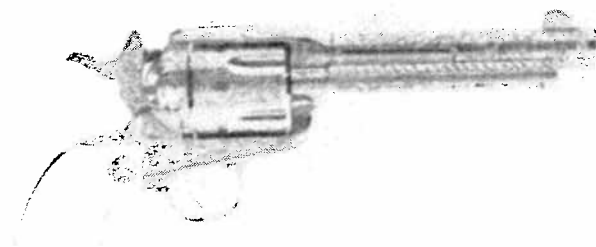
Keith shooting a S&W M-29. This picture was used on the head of his "Gun Notes" column each month for years.



This new .41 Magnum cartridge was recently introduced by the Remington Arms Company for use in the Smith & Wesson Model 57 revolver.



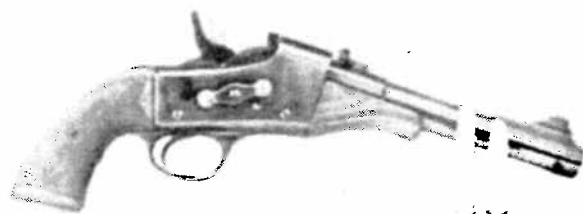

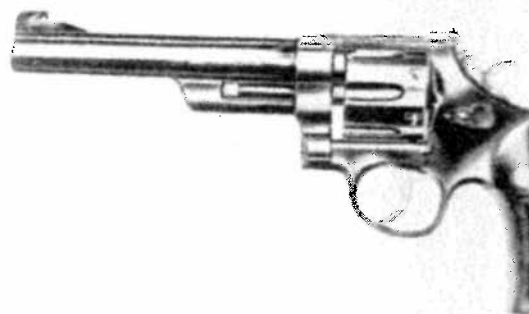
This single action Colt .45 is handsomely engraved.
