### REPAIRS/RESTORATION:

HISTORICAL/ARTISTIC SIGNIFICANCE: Jacob Kunz has been referred to as "in a class by himself" by Joe Kindig, III. With its relatively flat, wide butt and large caliber, this is one of a handful of early over and under Kentucky rifles. Its heritage comes directly from the "Wender" Jeager rifles which were relatively common in Germany, 1700-1800. Jacob Kunz's architecture, proportions, and engraving are unsurpassed and for a two barreled gun it is hardly heavier than many single barreled guns.



### THE KUNTZ BROTHERS, JACOB AND PETER, GUNSMITHS

Allentown and Philadelphia, Pennsylvania

1807 - 1876

For years, collectors of fine Kentucky Rifles and Pistols have cherished the ownership of a gun made by either one of these two Kuntz Gunsmiths. Also, for years, there has been conjecture as to whether or not these two Gunsmiths were trained by the same hand and were they brothers.

A confusing fact is that Jacob Kuntz guns were often marked "Philadelphia, Pa."-and Peter Kuntz guns were marked, rarely, "Allentown, Pa."

The writer set out to prove whether or not these two smiths were brothers, and did they work together in Allentown.

After months of research, I was finally able to document the fact that these two were brothers, and both were trained in Allentown, both Taxed as Gunsmiths in Whitehall Township, Lehigh County, Pennsylvania.

In order to document such facts, the best way is to develop a geneology of all the known members of a family, their progenitors, and piece all the available material together. Documentation can then be directed with specific names and dates. This was done in the case of these two Kuntz brothers. This chart is shown as Exhibit #1.

The stumbling block in this documentation was the finding of the correct Peter Kuntz, who could be the father of Jacob and Peter Kuntz. There were several Peter Kuntz and Jacob Kuntz names in the annals of Lehigh and Northampton Counties during the period of their lives. For a period of time, I had located a Peter Kuntz Will and Estate Record, all in German, and I thought I had the correct one, only to learn, upon translation, that the Will I had translated was of a Peter Kuntz who only had one daughter -no sons. Strange, this Peter Kuntz died in the same year and month, but 10 days earlier than the Kuntz I was searching for.

At this point, it is important to note that Lehigh County was part of Northampton County, until the year 1815. Therefore, the Court House records for Allentown start after 1815. Knowing that the Peter Kuntz I was searching for died after 1815, I assumed that his Will or intestate records would be filed in Allentown. This is where I found the Peter Kuntz, who, after translating his Will, proved not the correct one.

Therefore, having worked many months in the Archives of Northampton County, I went back there in search of the correct Peter Kuntz. There I found his Inventory Record, his Administration Papers and all the data which gave the proof of the two sons, Jacob and Peter, as being of this particular Peter Kuntz. Exhibit #2 is a copy of Peter Kuntz, Sr. s Inventory. From this record, it is found that he left no Gunsmith tools, but was a grain miller. Also shown on Exhibit #3, is the renunciation of Jacob Kuntz, eldest son, as Administrator of his father Estate. The reason for this renunciation is, no doubt, due to the fact that he was a resident of Philadelphia and could not conveniently attend this settlement in Allentown or Northampton Courts.

Exhibit #4 shows the Court's appointment of Peter Kuntz, Jr., Solomon Kuntz and George Steward as Administrators of Peter Kuntz, Sr.'s Estate.

These documents established completely that Jacob Kuntz of Philadelphia and Peter Kuntz, Jr. of North Whitehall Township in Lehigh County were sons of the Peter Kuntz, Sr., and obviously brothers.

Referring back to Exhibit #1, the Geneological Chart of the Kuntz Family of Gunsmiths, we note that: -

Jacob Kuntz was born 9-6-1780 - Died 10-6-1876

and

Peter Kuntz was born in 1791 - Died in 1862

Their difference in ages may be seen to be 11 years. This would mean that Jacob would have a head start of 11 years over his brother Peter, in learning the Gunsmith trade. This fact is born out in the Tax records of Northampton County Archives when, for the first time, Jacob Kuntz, in 1807, is listed as a Gunsmith in Whitehall Township, Northampton County. Then, 10 years later, his brother Peter appears in the Tax lists for the first time in 1817. This is just 10 years after his brother Jacob appeared for the first time in the Tax records.

Therefore, it is conceivable that Peter Kuntz, being 11 years younger, could have been trained as an apprentice under his brother. An examination of their work reveals a very close similarity in style, design and workmanship.

In 1810, Jacob moved to Philadelphia, where, after a brief apprenticeship of six months, he embarked on a full career as a Gunsmith. In 1813, he advertised for business as a Gunsmith. In 1812 he married Barbara Newhard, niece of Peter Newhard, Gunsmith of Allentown 1743-1813. This is interesting and important, because it is conceivable that Peter Newhard had a hand in the training of Jacob Kuntz.

Further, to complicate the picture and confuse the issue as to who trained Jacob Kuntz, we find that Elizabeth Newhard, a cousin of Barbara Kuntz, married John Moll, son of Johannes Moll, Allentown's most famous Revolutionary Gunsmith.

An interesting item in Peter Neyhardt's (Neihardt) Inventory, taken after his death, and dated October 13, 1813, is of importance in the relationship of the Kuntz and Neyhardt Family of Gunsmiths. In the Inventory, under Notes and Bonds owed Peter Neyhardt, is found the name Peter Kuntz owing £ 20-0-0, which was approximately \$60.00. Could this Peter Kuntz have been the young Gunsmith? He would have been 22 years of age, maximum, and could have finished his apprenticeship under Neyhardt and borrowed the money to start his own shop. Yet, his father was living, and as a miller, should have been able to lend his son this same money. I don't know -this is one of the imponderables in trying to determine who trained these Kuntz Gunsmiths. A most mitigating factor against Neyhardt training Kuntz is that neither Kuntz Gunsmiths' finished rifles bear any resemblance to those of Neyhardt or Johannes Moll.

So far, we have only proven that Jacob Kuntz and Peter were brothers, that they were both Gunsmiths in Lehigh County, and that Jacob was 10 years earlier than Peter.

It is interesting to note that Jacob Kuntz was an excellent craftsman, and his workmanship was not excelled in the area. In fact, in 1833, The Franklin Institute of Philadelphia awarded Jacob Kuntz with a silver medal for his skill and ingenuity. He made the pair of sterling pistols used by Commodore Barry and Commodore Decatur in their famous duel.

His products were eagerly sought after by sportsmen in England, Scotland and America, and they brought high prices. Among his customers were Charles Peale and Albanus Logan, a descendent of William Penn's Secretary. He was an excellent engraver and a superb marksman.

Jacob Kuntz died at 1304 Caldwalder Street in Philadelphia, on August 6, 1876, at the age of 95 years and eleven months. He is buried with his wife in Union Cemetery, Allentown, Pennsylvania.

Jacob Kuntz\* gun shop was located at Germantown Road and 3rd Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Peter Kuntz died in Whitehall Township, Lehigh County, on October 6, 1862. He died without a Will, and the Court appointed Elias M. Kuntz, a son, to administer his Estate. Exhibit #5 is a record of this inventory taken and filed January 5, 1863. The usual Gunsmith tools and parts are found in this inventory.

He was buried with his brother in Union Cemetery in Allentown.

Peter Kuntz made excellent rifles and pistols, but could not match his brother Jacob Kuntz\* superb quality.

The above facts are the most important ones that I have found in researching these two excellent Gunsmiths. Their guns are superb, and command the highest prices in the gun collecting fraternity.

Married Susanna

This Kuntz is listed as a Gunsmith in the Northampton Tax lists from 1817 through 1830. He no doubt worked longer, but I did not search farther in the Tax records. He was ten years younger than his brother Jacob, as shown by his Tax date.
