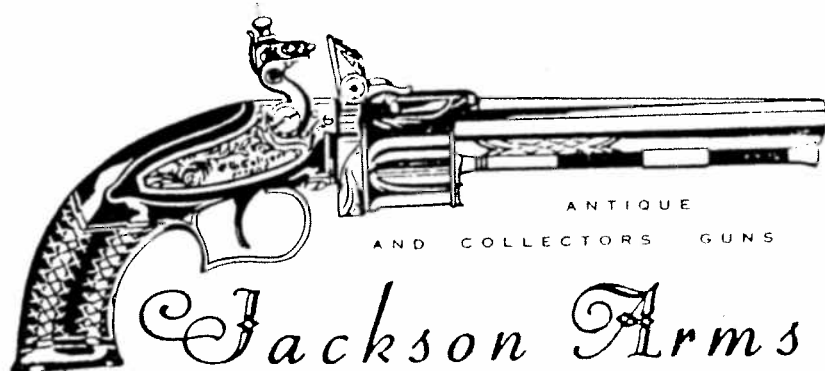
HISTORICAL/ARTISTIC SIGNIFICANCE: This is, without question, the longest barrel Kentucky pistol known. While it appears to be "strange" if one holds it, aims it, etc., it is apparent that its owner was a practical man.

PROVENANCE: It is far easier to carry (light weight), load, maneuver through brush etc. and avoid gain (less danger), rifle class accuracy to 50 yards or more - which is essentially all that was needed.

PUBLICATIONS: Unusual yes - but its owner was no fool!!!

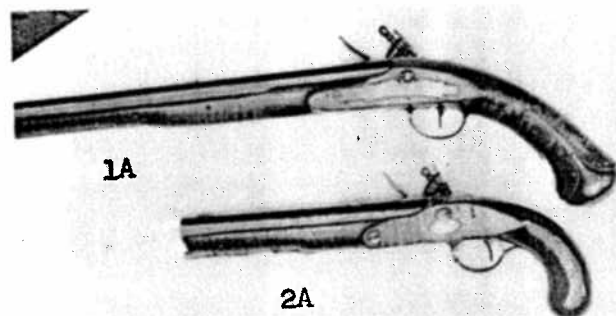
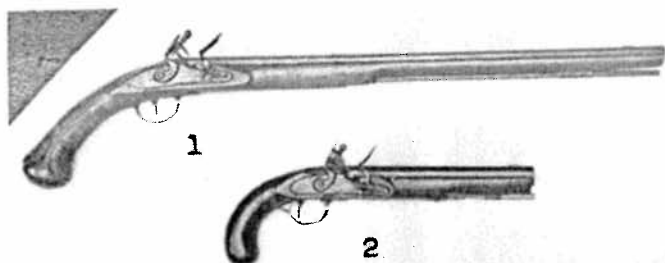

① A most unusual Kentucky pistol - a horseman's pistol, unsigned except for the flint lock which is marked, "W. Ketland & Co.". The "Ketland & Co." marking was used from 1789 to 1798, and was probably sold through their Philadelphia outlet. The gun is 28½" over all with 21" octagon barrel, caliber .44 rifled. The style of the iron hardware and the side plate suggests that this gun was probably made in the Baltimore, Maryland, area. It is full stocked in curly maple which, with age considered, is in excellent condition. There is a small sliver off the left side of the fore-end, but not serious enough to repair. The butt cap is typical Queen Anne style with long tangs running up the side of the grips. The over all condition is excellent. \$4,500.00.

2. A more conventional Kentucky pistol with the flint lock signed, "Samuel Moore". The gun is 13½" over all with 8½" octagon barrel, caliber .45, rifled. The hardware is of brass with one unusual feature on the trigger guard. The trigger guard was apparently taken from an older English pistol that had a pineapple finial. The pineapple portion was cut off or broken off before it was put to use on this gun. It is inletted properly and is undoubtedly original with this gun. There is a small burned area in the wood just above the lockplate by the hammer which we do not think substantially detracts from its appearance, but does indicate substantial use. The wood of the stock is particularly fine and beautifully grained curly maple. It is in excellent condition. In our opinion, the piece would date 1800 or perhaps two or three years later. Price is \$2,000.00.

Left side of relic Colt 3rd Model Dragoon Serial No. 17309

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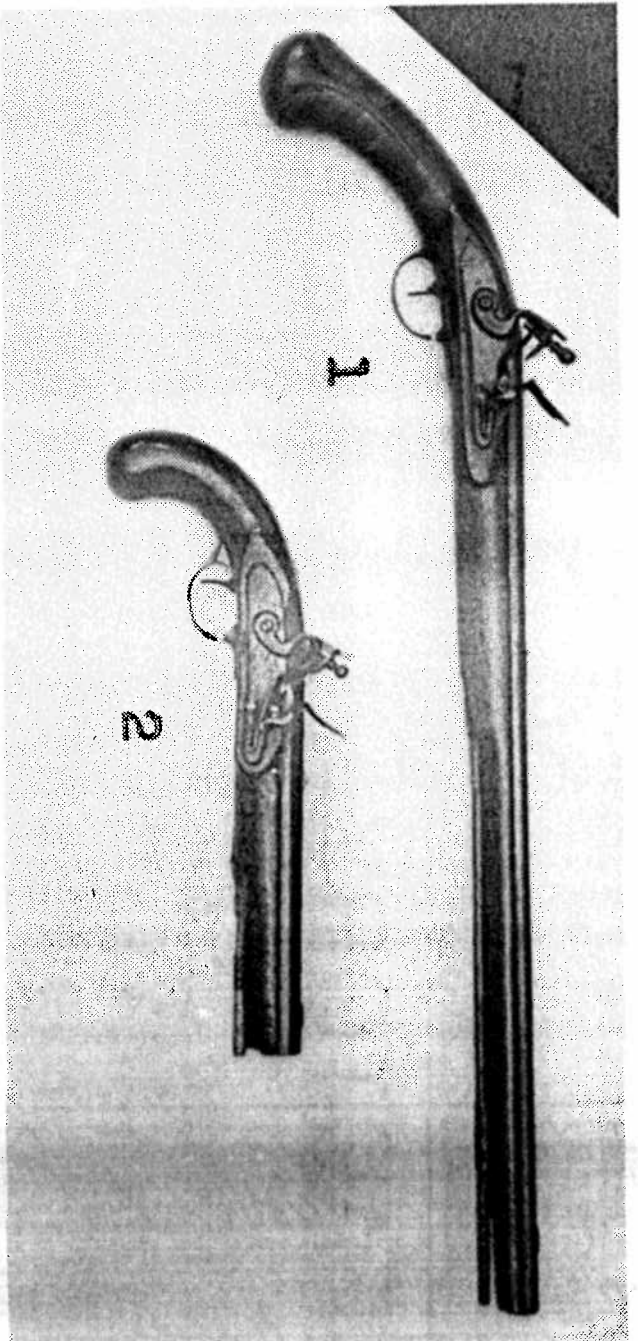


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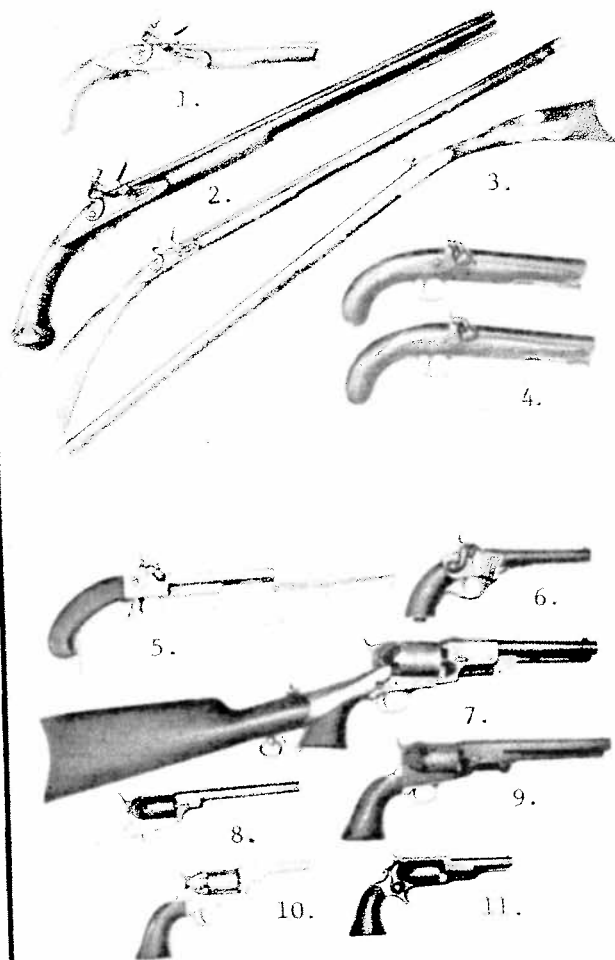

1. An English Flintlock, brass barrel pistol by W. Ketland & Co. of the type popular in this country in the Revolutionary and Continental Periods. Exceptionally nice condition. 14" over all. 8" brass barrel; caliber .54. Brass furniture **\$550.00**

2. A unique, highly desirable American Kentucky horseman's pistol, circa 1790, unmarked as to maker with original Ketland Flintlock. 28" in over all length, 20" octagon barrel, caliber .44 rifled. The full stock is of highly grained curly maple (a small sliver off the fore-end on the left side). Queen Anne style iron butt cap and iron trigger guard, brass sideplate. An exceptional American gun. **\$4,500.00**

3. A beautifully executed, matching pair (made to 1/3 scale) miniature Kentucky rifles. 32" in over all length with 22" octagon barrel, caliber .38. The full stocks are of walnut with brass trigger guards and butt plates. All other mounting are engraved silver including a handsome

pierced patchbox and 15 engraved silver inlays. The maker and the date of manufacture of these are unknown, but there is a long history of ownership in a major collection. **The pair is priced at \$4,000.00, or we will separate them at \$2,000.00 each.**

4. Here is super condition in a pair of percussion Officer's Pistols by Richardson of Edinburgh, Scotland. 11 1/2" in over all length, 6" octagon barrels, cal. .54 smoothbore. Stirrup ramrods, belt hooks, full walnut stocks. The barrels retain most of their original brown damascus finish, and the stocks are unworn showing all their original varnish. Actions are as crisp and tight as new. **(the pair) \$1,250.00**

5. The extremely rare U.S. Martial Elgin Cutlass Pistol, serial #7. Well marked and dated 1837. 17" over all; 11 1/2" heavy blade, numbered to match the gun. The piece has been cleaned and highly polished. **\$3,000.00**

6. Sharps Single shot percussion pistol, 1st type, one of only 500 made. 5" barrel, cal. .34; marked "Sharps Patent Arms Mfd Fairmount, Phila. Pa." in an oval panel on the left side of frame. No original blue on the barrel, but a little mottling reminiscent of case hardening on the frame and lever. Metal is smooth with a good patina. Grips show some original finish. All original and in excellent mechanical order. **\$2,500.00**

7. Colt 3rd Model Dragoon serial #16557 with original Colt stock, #16587. All numbers match on the gun though the number on the cylinder is not visible. 7 1/2" barrel has the correct folding leaf rear sight. Left frame is marked, "Colt's Patent U.S.". There is no finish and no cylinder engraving, but markings are clear and lines are sharp. The gun has been rusted and cleaned and there are several areas of nicking and light pitting on the loading lever, barrel lug and frame. Grips are original and good and the gun is in good working order. The stock is completely original. Its yoke has been cleaned in similar manner to the gun. The wood is very good. This gun has seen much service and that was the way Samuel Colt wanted it. Here is an opportunity to own an original, representative specimen at a favorable price. **\$1,950.00**

8. Colt Baby Dragoon Model 1848 Pocket Revolver with 6" barrel, serial #11704. No finish; faint traces of cylinder engraving, the "Colt's Patent" marking and number clear on the cylinder. Some scattered discoloration and very light pitting but generally clean and very good. Fine original one-piece ivory grips. **\$1,200.00**

9. Colt 1851 Navy with small trigger guard, serial #149099, made in 1863. The finish was originally tinned for naval use, and good traces of that finish remain. Cylinder scene is visible not sharp. One-line N.Y. address. Very good mechanical order. **\$750.00**

10. Colt '71-72 Police Model, not a conversion, but made as a cartridge gun. Caliber .38 centerfire, 3 1/2" barrel. 95% or more original nickel finish; good, sharp cylinder engraving and fine walnut grips. Full case hardening on hammer and trigger. **\$800.00**

11. Colt Root Revolver, 2nd type, caliber .28 with 3 1/2" octagon barrel. Frame shows 85% original blue finish, the barrel about 20%. The cylinder scene is good, excellent walnut grips with all the original varnish. Serial is 15443. **\$450.00**

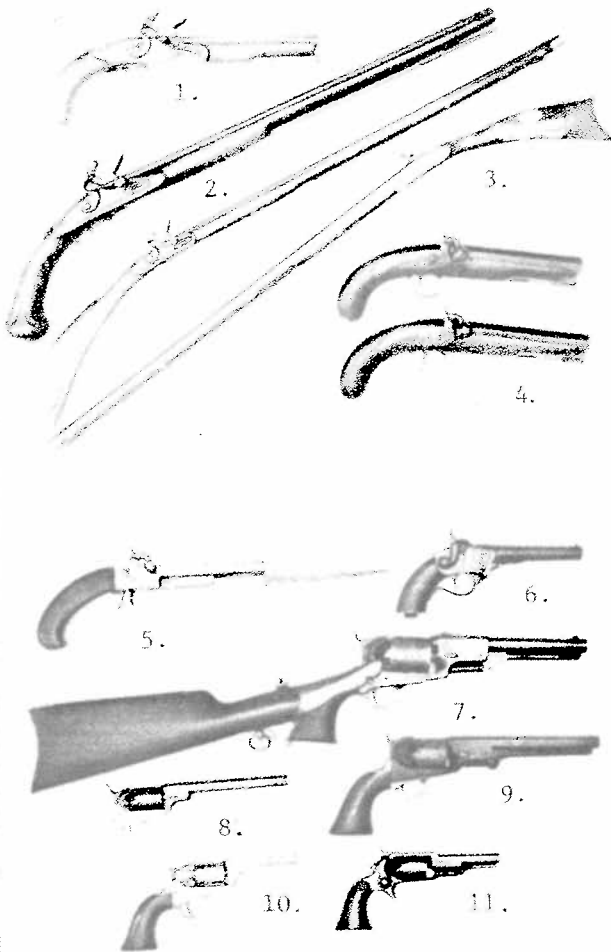
