

For at least 120 years prior to 1980, and probably from some time in the 18th century this very early rifle has been owned by various members of the Davis family of Augusta Co., Va. Robert Ralph Davis, aged 76 in 1980, stated that his father, Robert Friend Davis, joined the Confederate forces as a lad of 16 and took this rifle with him. R. F. Davis' great grandfather, Maj. Robert Davis, born in 1738, was a veteran of the French & Indian War, Lord Dunmore's War, and the American Revolution as a member of Morgan's Riflemen, and this rifle may have belonged to him. The initials "A D" are scratched on both sides of the comb of the butt. The name Johanes Fåber' is engraved on the side-plate, and this may be the name of the maker, though no gunsmith of this name has been documented. Fåber is an old name among the people who settled and who still live on the western and eastern slopes of the Blue Ridge near Staunton.


A very early origin for this rifle seems probable, i.e. the 1740's, 1750's or 1760's. The piece retains its original flintlock in un-altered condition, an English lock of a pattern dating to this time period. The architecture of the stock likewise can be characterized as colonial Southern with Germanic influence. The furniture likewise shows continental influence. The rear ramnod pipe has an unusually long pointed finial. Around the barrel tang an elaborate shell-like design is carved in relief. The wooden patchbox lid is a modern replacement that probably is more elaborately decorated than the original was. This rifle, together with the hunting bag, powder horn, and accoutrements that went with it, are on display at the Shenandoah Longrifles Museum at Montebello, Va., near Staunton.


The name "Wm Antes" is signed in script on one of the barrels and also on the lock-plate of this double-barreled swivel-breech rifle. Eighteenth century double rifles are very scarce, and this is the earliest one that I know of. It probably was made during the decade of the 1780's or a few years on either side thereof. Early in the 20th century this piece was donated to the Kansas State Historical Society in Topeka.

A number of decorative details enhance this rifle and make it of considerable interest to the longrifle student. Each of the two barrels holds a fancy iron sight with an elaborate front finial. The gun is stocked in walnut, with walnut fore-stock panels. Carved in the wood immediately in front of the lock mechanism on either side of the gun is the curious head with hat that so frequently is found on rifles of the Lehigh Valley from the 1780's on into the 19th century. There is decorative carving around the barrel tang and at the front end of the comb on either side. At the rear end of the lock and side-plate flats the relief mouldings terminate in a fleur-de-lis design, a detail usually associated with the Lehigh Valley. The design carved in relief behind the cheek-piece is notable in that it is completely unlike the designs of the Christian Spring — Lehigh Valley - Lancaster complex. But it should be noted that the design takes the same form as found on the rifles by Valentine Fondersmith, No. 74, and John Schock, No. 75. The butt-plate extension along the comb terminates in a thumb-nail finial. The four-piece engraved brass patch-southwest from there during the Federal Period. "




John Thomas of Spartanburg, South Carolina, was the owner of this rifle, and his initials are present on the silver thumb-piece. During one of the battles of the Revolution, Thomas and his rifle were captured by the British in Newberry Co. The intrepid English cavalry officer and gun fancier, Col. George Hanger, brought the rifle back to England after the war and later presented it to Prince George for the royal collection. The prince and his associates were fond of shooting, and about 1802 this piece was worked over extensively by the famous gunsmith, Durs Egg, who presented his bill for it on 26 Jan. 1803. He straightened, repaired, leaded and browned the barrel, made a new ramrod, provided a walnut English-style fore-end for the stock, replaced the old lock with a smaller one of his own, which required inletting a piece of wood to hold the lock, replaced the brass side-plate with a piece of walnut, replaced the double-set triggers with a single-set trigger, and moved the guard forward. In spite of the depredation by Durs Egg, the piece remains as a splendid example of a southern rifle from the Revolutionary War years, and as a standard by which to judge others. The barrel is unsigned. John Bivins has suggested that James Robertson of Spartanburg Co., S.C., may have been the maker.


The architecture of this rifle, and the decoration, are splendid. The comb stands high and the cheek-piece is of good size. Relief carving is plentiful. The tripple or quadrupple-scroll design carved behind the cheek-piece is unusual and particularly fine. On the cheek-piece is a silver star inlay with 13 points bearing the inscription "UNITED STATES: WE ARE ONE" The side-opening patchbox has an unusual design and is most handsome. The engraving is well designed and carried out. Silver wire inlay surrounds the patchbox. This rifle is in the royal collection at Windsor Castle, and all illustrations except f. 121h and f. 121m have copyright reserved to H.M. the Queer










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
