Combatalizer, Mexico City, Mexico, Jan. 26, 1910, four guns in shipment, all features verified by factory letter, except grips not listed. #511007. Revolver remains in good to very good original condition showing approx. 30%-50% original blue on barrel and cylinder, light to moderate surface pitting and slightly heavier pitting on the left front side of muzzle and left side of barrel, probably from moisture and being in a holster. Frame shows 30%-50% case hardening turning silver with some good traces of rainbow color mostly on the front of frame, straps show 30%-50% thinning and toning, blue, there is some light to moderate surface erosion and pitting on the backstrap; grips are good to very good with minor dings, marks and slight imperfections, front sight has been rounded just a little, action is good, bore is excellent, markings are sharp. Approx. 5500 Bisleys were made in .41 cal. Combatalizer was a famous Mexico City dealer who received firearms for President Diaz, Pancho Villa, and other Mexican Revolutionary War era generals and politicians. Est.: \$2,000-\$3,000.



DIRECTIONS FOR USING COLT'S NEW

To load the Pistol.

1st position—Half cock the pistol with the right hand, and open the back.

2nd position—Take the pistol in the left hand, nozzle pointed down.

3rd position—Turn the revolver so as to connect with the right hand, with the barrel pointing to the right hand, or bring the hammer in the safety notch, as may be desired.

To Eject the Cartridge Shells.

1st position—Half cock the pistol with the right hand, and open the back.

2nd position—Take the pistol in the left hand, and with the trigger pressed by the right hand, open the shell in position.

3rd position—When the shells have been ejected, the pistol is ready for the final position of loading.

To take the Pistol to Pieces.

1st position—the cover is freed and it comes away from the barrel, the hammer being held by the left hand, draw out the hammer, and then cylinder case can be withdrawn.



HAMILTON

It is necessary to remove the cover of this pistol, then free the hammer notch, the cover will be held with the left hand, and then the cylinder case can be freed when the hammer rests in the notch notch, the pistol will be held with the right hand, the cover being held by the left hand. The pistol, when broken, should be wrapped with the hammer resting in the safety notch.


