ONE HUNDRED AND SIXTY-EIGHTH REGIMENT OF INFANTRY.

Nineteenth Militia.

September 18, 1862, the offer of service of the 19th Regiment of the National Guard was accepted by the Governor of the State, and Col. Wm. R. Brown authorized to recruit his regiment to full numbers and for a service of nine months; it was designated the 168th Regiment of Volunteers, organized at Newburgh, and there mustered in the service of the United States January 23d, Company K, however, not until February 11, 1863.

The companies were recruited principally: A at Wallkill, Montgomery, Mount Hope, Lisle, Coventry and New York city; B at Newburgh, Walden and Fishkill; C, D—*Washington Continentals*—and I at Newburgh; E at Peekskill, Newburgh and Yorktown; F—*Newburgh Guard*—at Newburgh, Fishkill, Poughkeepsie and New York city; G at Newburgh, Crawford and Rondout; H at Goshen, Bainbridge, Union, Greene, Binghamton, Lisle and Fishkill; and K at Fishkill, Montgomery, Poughkeepsie and New York city.

The regiment left the State February 12, 1863; it served at Yorktown, Va., in Bussey's Brigade, 1st Division, 4th Corps, from February, 1863; in King's Brigade, 1st Division, 4th Corps, from April, 1863; in the 22d Corps, from June, 1863; in the 2d Brigade, 2d Division, 11th Corps, from July, 1863; and, commanded by Colonel Brown, it was honorably discharged and mustered out October 31, 1863, at Newburgh, N. Y.

During its service the regiment lost by death, killed in action, 1 enlisted man; of disease and other causes, 1 officer, 36 enlisted men; total, 1 officer, 37 enlisted men; aggregate, 38; and it took part in the following engagements, etc.:

On this 27 day of December, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine personally appeared before me, C. F. Brown, Judge of the County Court of Orange County Court of Record within and for the county and State aforesaid, R. Howard Wallace, aged 51 years, who, being duly sworn according to law, declares that he is the identical R. Howard

Wallace, who was ENROLLED on the Fri day of October, 1862, in company 168th regiment of Infantry N.Y. S. Vol commanded by Col. Tom R. Brown, and was honorably DISCHARGED at Pittsburgh, Pa. on the 31st day of October, 1863, that his personal description is as follows: Age, 51 years; height, 5 feet 10 inches; complexion, light hair, dark; eyes, blue. That while a member of the organization aforesaid, in the service and in the line of his duty at Various place, in the State of Virginia mainly from on or about the 15th day of February, 1863 he Contracted general disease in health, including diarrhea. Here state name or nature of disease, or the location of wound or injury. If disabled by disease, state fully its cause; if by wound or injury, the precise manner in which received.

Deponents service was as Chaplain. That he was treated in hospitals as follows: He was home during service illness or forbrought and was for some time under charge of Dr. Delville connected with the Surgeon General's office at Washington City D.C. Here state the names or numbers, and the localities of all hospitals in which treated, and the dates of treatment.

That he has not been employed in the military or naval service otherwise than as stated above. Here state what the service

was whether, prior or subsequent to that stated above, and the dates at which it began and ended.

That since leaving the service this applicant has resided in the town of New Windsor in the State of New York, and his occupation has been that of a Minister of the Gospel. That prior to his entry into the service above named he was a man of good, sound, physical health, being then enrolled a Minister. That he is now partially disabled from obtaining his subsistence by manual labor, by reason of his injuries, above described, received in the service of the United States; and he therefore makes this declaration for the purpose of being placed on the invalid pension.





The Commissioner of Pensions,

Sir:

Herewith are returned the papers which accompanied your report of April 16, 1892, in the claim of R. Howard Wallace, Chaplain 168th New York Infantry Volunteers, on appeal.

Appellant was granted a pension at \$10 per month from November 1, 1863, for chronic diarrhoea and results.

A reissue was made at \$15 from April 6, 1882, and \$20 from February 22, 1888, to include chronic diarrhoea, general debility and malarial poisoning.

December 2, 1889, appellant filed an application for increase and rerating alleging that he was entitled to a greater

-2-

amount of pension, and that the rating for malarial poisoning should cover the period from the date of his discharge to April 6, 1882.

That part of his claim which related to increase was rejected on the ground that he had been adequately pensioned therefor, and so much thereof as related to rerating on malarial poisoning was rejected on the ground that he could not be rated thereon as an independent disability, prior to April 6, 1882, the date on which he filed his declaration therein.

From this action the appeal is taken.

Claimant's original declaration was filed December 29, 1879, in which he alleged "that in the line of duty at various places in Virginia he contracted general debility, ill health including diarrhoea."

In an affidavit filed April 6, 1882, he alleged that from February 18, to July 4, 1863, he suffered much of his time from Peninsular diarrhoea, and malaria resulting in anaemia and liver difficulty and general physical prostration.

It is evident that the claimant alleged malaria as an original disability and not as a resultant disability, and not having alleged it until April 6, 1882, and not prior to July 1st, 1880, he could not reasonably expect it to carry arrears.

-3-

It does not appear that at any time a grade rate has been recommended by any Board, in the absence of which it is evident that a \$20 rate is as high a rate as could properly be accorded for "total of rank," for the rank that claimant held, which was that of chaplain.

The action of rejection is affirmed.

In the matter of the appeal in the above cited claim, I have the honor, in response to the departmental call of March 25, 1891, to submit the following statement:

Appellant was granted a pension at \$10 per month from November 1, 1863, for chronic diarrhoea and results.

A re-issue was made at \$15 from April 6, 1882, and \$20 from February 22, 1888, to include chronic diarrhoea, general debility, and malarial poisoning.

December 2, 1889, appellant filed an application for increase and re-rating, alleging that he was entitled to a higher amount of pension, and that the rating for malarial poisoning ^{should} cover the period from the date of his discharge.

The claim involving title to increase for the aforesaid causes except malarial trouble, was rejected on the ground that he had been adequately pensioned therefor, and that part of the claim relating to re-rating for malarial poisoning was rejected on the ground that there was no provision of law under which he could be pensioned for malarial poisoning, as an independent disability, prior to April 6, 1882, the date when he first filed his declaration alleging the same, from which action this appeal is taken.



ty, which claim covered all causes.

Third: -

The words, "including diarrhea," in the application, were entire-
ly subordinate, totally unessential, were not designed as the "alle-
gation," of basis of claim, and were unnecessary as used, as the
proofs showed the causes of the condition alleged.

Fourth: -

This was the initial error. The "allegation," was a general
result. Pension was granted for a PARTIAL CAUSE of the EFFECT ALL-
EGED. The less was substituted for the greater. A part made to stand
for the whole. Thus, other parts were ruled out.

of which no record is made of all the causes, inducing General Disability. To be examined on ALL CAUSES was my right.

Act of Congress, approved July 25th 1882, Sec. 4 reads: "That all examinations shall be thorough and searching, and the certificate contain a full description of the physical condition of the Claimant, at the time which shall include ALL the physical and rational signs, and a statement of all the structural changes."

September 20, 1882, I demanded examination on all causes for claim alleged, and this was refused. This is a marked error and wrong to me.

Sixth: -

Under erroneous interpretation of original allegation, the Dept asserts that I first alleged "Malarial Poisoning," April 6th 1882. Why then was I refused examination, on this cause (which the Court says was alleged as above) when demanded of Brooklyn Board, nearly six months later? And also when by affidavit at about the same date (September 1882) the facts were laid before the Court, and examination demanded?

This is a gross error and wrong.

Seventh: -

The Honorable Commissioner Black, in a letter to Hon. F.A. Johnson, Glens Falls, says I have received all that is warranted by disability, "SHOWN TO EXIST."

If not shown, why not? Because of,

First, Error in interpreting the alleged basis of claim, and

Eighth: -

The application, made September 1882, to amend the original, was not due to any change of views, or intent, but with the purpose of meeting the interpretation insisted on by the Dept, whereby cause was substituted for effect. (Sec.12)

Ninth: -

In defiance of law, other facts (excluded) and an admitted allegation prior thereto. Certificate was issued Jan. 1883, ignoring the original, and (as asserted) subsequent allegation, which was a gross error.

Tenth: -

Certificate was issued for \$10.00 per month, only which was an error as the testimony clearly showed Total Disability. Your date of discharge from service, and a "thorough and searching" examination of all physical signs, " as demanded by law, but unjustly and erroneously denied, would have fully sustained the original allegation in "General Debility," from all causes. This is confirmed by the fact that when claimant finally secured a "thorough" examination, his pension was increased to \$20.00 per month, as entitled for Total Disability, " shown to exist in 1863.

Eleventh: -

Error was made in Re -issue in allowing \$15.00 per month, from April 6th 1882 (on the basis of the Honorable Commissioner's assertion that Malarial Poisoning was then first alleged) because

REPORT.

[To accompany H. R. 15768.]

The Committee on Pensions, to whom was referred the bill (H. R. 15768) granting an increase of pension to R. Howard Wallace, have examined the same and report:

The report of the Committee on Invalid Pensions of the House of Representatives, hereto appended, is adopted and the passage of the bill is recommended.

The House report is as follows:

The officer, now 76 years of age, served as chaplain of the One hundred and sixty-eighth New York Volunteers from February 13, 1863, to October 31, 1863, when honorably discharged with the regiment.

The medical records of the War Department show him treated in October, 1863, for diarrhea.

He is now pensioned under the general law at \$20 per month (total of his rank) on account of chronic diarrhea and resulting general debility, and malarial poisoning.

Claims for increase of pension were rejected, the last one in July, 1904, upon the ground that a higher rating was not warranted.

When last examined, in March, 1904, the board of surgeons at Utica, N. Y., rated him \$4 for diarrhea, \$6 for piles, \$10 for a hernia, and \$6 for slight deafness of both ears.

Medical and other testimony filed with your committee shows that the officer is a severe sufferer from chronic enteritis and malarial poisoning incurred in the service; that these long-continued disabilities have produced cerebral anæmia and general weakness, so that he now demands frequent aid and assistance under physician's directions; that he possesses no property, and that his only income consists of a small conditional annuity from a church board of relief, he being wholly unfit for literary or professional services.

Your committee is satisfied that the officer's disabilities of service origin are such as to wholly prevent him from the performance of any manual labor.

Under these circumstances he is entitled to the rate of pension provided under the general law for that condition—namely, \$30 per month—and the passage of the bill is therefore recommended.

Yorktown was once a place of several thousand people but at the beginning of the war it had become depopulated & destroyed.

Defendant says he believes the claimant became poisoned by that malaria & has never recovered from it. That he knew nearly all of the officers of the claimants Regt. What now nearly all of them dead: of the Field Staff only the claimant & Dr. Mast are living. That he did not meet the claimant for a

Defendant also says that after his mustered out
the claimant was in such poor health that
he was obliged to settle down in a limited
field of labor, a place not equal to the great
attainments of the claimant, that he was obliged
to refuse acceptance of offers to assume the

Tongue coated; skin normal; body well nourished; liver & spleen normal; stomach distended & tender. Rating 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ /8
Piles:

Facts within the knowledge of the Board, or any member thereof, relative to the cause of any disability found should be stated.

Whenever a disability is shown or is believed to be due to or aggravated by vicious habits the opinion of the board must be stated. When not due to such habits this fact must be stated.

He shows 3 internal piles, each $\frac{3}{4}$ " thick, turgid & inflamed, and ulcerated & bleeding - Rating 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ /8

Hernia:

He shows left obtuse inguinal hernia; tumor 3" by 2"; past 6" extensible ring; rings $1\frac{1}{2}$ " wide - Hydrocele or varicocele - Reducible & wears truss - Rating 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ /8

Deafness:

He can hear ordinary conversation with creaker at 2 ft. not beyond - Both drums thick & retracted, tubes closed. Rating 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ /30

Heart is normal in size, position, force, rhythm; no murmur; apex normal; no dyspnoea, oedema or cyanosis -

Chest resounds at rest $3\frac{1}{2}$ "; inspiration $38\frac{1}{2}$ "; expiration $36\frac{1}{2}$.

Percussion & auscultation normal.

Urinalysis: color yellow; sp. gr. 1.023; reaction acid; no albumin; no sugar.

Except as above no disabilities exist -
