This refers to the submitted Winchester, Model 1873 Saddle Ring Carbine, received by the Firearms Technology Branch (FTB), Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF), May 31, 2013, as well as all recent correspondence in connection with this item. You submitted this firearm for consideration for removal from the provisions of the National Firearms Act (NFA).

As you are aware, the term "firearm" as defined in the NFA, 26 U.S.C. Section 5845(a) (3), includes a rifle having a barrel or barrels of less than 16 inches in length. It is unlawful for anyone to possess an NFA firearm that is not registered in accordance with the provisions of the NFA.

However, Section 5845(a)(3) also states that this term shall <u>not</u> include a weapon which the Attorney General "finds by reason of the date of its manufacture, value, design, and other characteristics is primarily a collector's item and is not likely to be used as a weapon."

Based on the information you provided, as well as our research and examination, FTB has determined the following firearm is primarily a collector's item and is not likely to be used as a weapon. Accordingly, the firearm is hereby removed from the provision of the NFA:

Winchester, 1873 Saddle Ring Carbine, .44 W.C.F. caliber, serial number 604237B; with factory-fitted 14-inch barrel.

As you may be aware, a regulation implementing Federal firearms laws, 27 CFR Section 478.11 defines C&R firearms as those "which are of special interest to collectors by reason of some quality other than is associated with firearms intended for sporting use or as an offensive or defensive weapons."

To be recognized as C&R items, this section specifies that firearms must fall within one of the following categories:

- (a) Firearms which were manufactured at least 50 years prior to the current date, but not including replicas of such firearms.
- (b) Firearms which are certified by the curator of a municipal, State or Federal museum which exhibits firearms to be curios or relics of museum interest; and
- (c) Any other firearms which derive a substantial part of their monetary value from the fact that they are novel, rare, bizarre, or because of their association with some historical figure, period, or event.

Proof of qualification of a particular firearm under category (c) may be established by evidence of present value and evidence that like firearms are not available except as collector's items, or that the value of like firearms available except as collector's items or that the value of like firearms available in ordinary commercial channels is substantially less.


Our research has confirmed that the submitted firearm was manufactured at least 50 years prior to the current date, as described in category (a) above. Accordingly, we have found the above listed firearm to be a curio or relic ("C&R") item as defined in 27 CFR Section 478.11. This determination authorizes licensed collectors to acquire, hold, or dispose of it as a C&R firearm subject to the provisions of 18 U.S.C. Chapter 44 and 27 CFR Part 478. It remains a "firearm" as defined in 18 U.S.C. Section 921(a) (3).

We thank you for your inquiry and trust that the foregoing has been responsive to your request. The carbine will be returned to you using your Federal Express account number.


Along with the carbine I have included the original copy of the Winchester Firearms Museum letter verifying the original shipment of this gun in 1906 and specifying a 14" barrel.
