SUBJECT: Authority to Retain Privately Owned Firearm

Provost Marshal
USAADCEN and Fort Bliss

1. Reference is made to para 3c, USAADCEN Reg 210-10 subject: Firearms and Other Weapons, dated 11 June 1965.
2. It is requested that exception be granted with respect to referenced paragraph of USAADCEN Reg 210-10 as applicable to my retention of an antique firearm in my bachelor officers' quarters (BOQ). The firearm concerned is a Model 1860 Henry Repeating Rifle, Caliber 44RF, Serial No. 2710 registered with your office on 8 January 1968. The control number assigned is 1065. Although this firearm is operable, ammunition for it is virtually unobtainable with only a relatively few cartridges found today in specimen cartridge collections.
3. Although the weapon concerned is by definition a firearm, its only true value is that of a collector's item. The rifle is also of historical significance as it has a documented history of usage in the Civil War (1861-65). Its value is conservatively estimated to be \$850.00 and it is insured with the General Accident Fire and Life Assurance Corporation, Ltd., of Philadelphia, Pa. The rifle has never been fired since I acquired it in 1966 nor do I have any intentions of ever trying to fire it in the future.
4. Because of the firearm's value I do not wish to entrust its care to unit arms room personnel, who might unintentionally damage one or more delicate parts which could never be repaired or replaced. It is primarily for this reason I do not wish to store this antique firearm in a unit arms room.

commission house of J. M. Sandidge and company, at New Orleans. Before the war he was a member of the State legislature, and served two terms in the United States congress, in 1854-60. His only defeat, and that by a small majority, was as a candidate for delegate to the constitutional convention of 1860, on the Union ticket. When the war began he went to the front as member of an independent company, each member of which defrayed his own expenses, the Confederate government paying no part of the cost of maintaining the company. In Virginia he was soon in active scouting duty, and on July 18, 1861, was distinguished in an affair near New Market bridge. This was reported by Col. Ro. Johnston as follows:

"I have the honor to report that a volunteer scout, consisting of Private W. Causey, Old Dominion Dragoons, Colonel Sandidge and son, and Mr. Terrett, of Louisiana, attached to the Charles City cavalry, returned to my camp this morning, bringing in as prisoners Capt. E. W. Jenkins and Lieut. R. M. Shurtleff, both of the naval brigade. They met near the New Market bridge a party of six, supposed to have been annoying our pickets; killed one, Maj. T. E. Rawlings, wounded the two brought in and put the rest to flight."

After the battle of First Manassas Colonel Sandidge returned to Louisiana on account of sickness, and later organized the Bossier cavalry, with which he served in Mississippi, participating in the battles of Iuka and Corinth. When Gen. H. W. Allen was made governor of the State, he called Colonel Sandidge to his staff as chief of ordnance, the position he held until the close of hostilities, when he surrendered by special request of Governor Allen, surrendering the archives of the State to Major-General Herron.

James Gilmore Sandidge, of Bastrop, son of Col. J. M. Sandidge, was born in Louisiana, November 9, 1845, and was educated in Maryland. At the beginning of the war he enlisted as a private soldier in Phillips' Virginia cavalry, and served on the Virginia peninsula and at the first battle of Manassas. Subsequently returning to Louisiana with his father, he joined the Bossier cavalry, Capt. Thomas M. Fuller, which became part of Gen. Frank Armstrong's command in Mississippi. With this company he was on duty during the siege of Corinth by the Federals and the battle of Farmington, and subsequently shared the active

operations of Armstrong's cavalry, including the battles of Iuka and Corinth in the fall of 1862. Later in the war he participated in the battle of Mansfield, and for a time he was attached to the staff of Colonel Turnbull, chief of the secret service, Trans-Mississippi department, as acting adjutant. His brother, George Sandidge, born July 5, 1843, served with him in Virginia, and at the age of nineteen years was made captain of a Louisiana cavalry company. The two brothers went to Brazil after the fall of the Confederacy, and traveled in that country for two years, then returning to Louisiana, where George died in 1876. James G., who had been engaged in planting with his brother up to this time, then went West and followed the profession of mining engineering until the death of his father, when he returned to Bastrop, where he has charge of the large real estate holdings left by Colonel Sandidge.

Leonce Sandoz, adjutant of R. E. Lee camp, United Confederate veterans, of Opelousas, was born at that city March 15, 1844. He is a grandson of Jean Henri Sandoz, a native of Switzerland, who settled at St. Martinsville in 1829, and son of Joel Henri Sandoz, who accompanied his father at the age of fourteen years, became a prominent man in his parish and founded the Opelousas Courier. The latter married Anna Wilbourne, a native of South Carolina. Leonce Sandoz entered the Confederate service in 1861, among the earliest volunteers, enlisting in Capt. James C. Pratt's company, the Opelousas Guards, which was mustered in as Company F of the Eighth regiment, Louisiana infantry, under Col. H. B. Kelly. Accompanying his regiment to Virginia, he participated in the battles of Front Royal and Winchester in Stonewall Jackson's great Shenandoah valley campaign, and on the retreat from Winchester was taken prisoner, June 18, 1862, near Middletown. He was held at Ft. Delaware until exchanged August 5, 1862, near Richmond, with the first lot of prisoners exchanged in Virginia. After a few weeks' rest at Richmond he returned to his command, after the battle of Sharpsburg, and in the following October was transferred to the Trans-Mississippi department. He then re-enlisted in the St. Martin's Rangers, better known as "the Bull Battery," with which he served until the close of the war. He had an active and adventurous career in western Louisiana under Gen. Richard Taylor, being one of the crew of the famous gunboat
