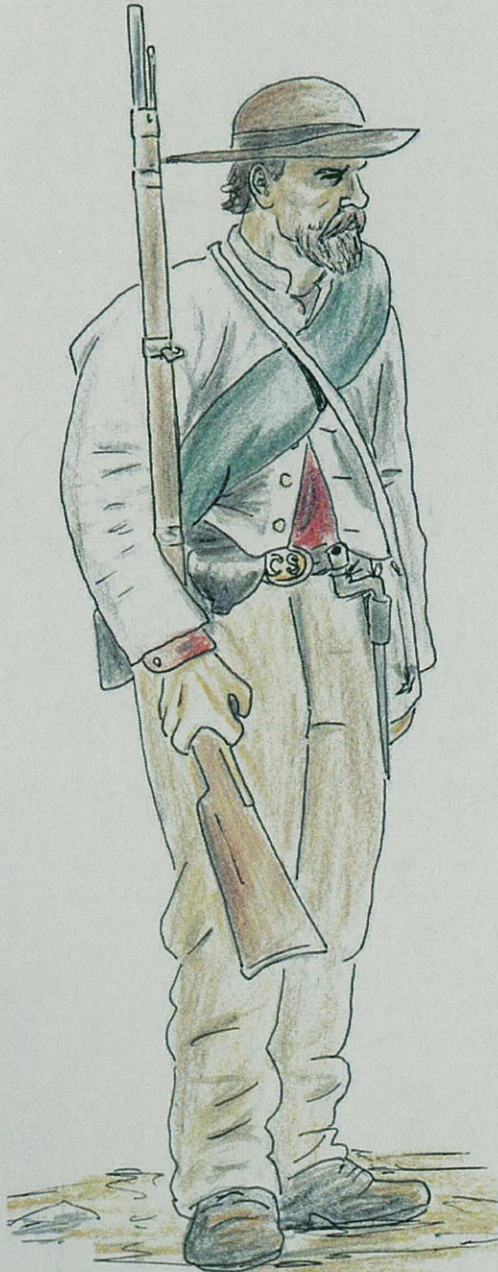



"FAUQUIER ARTILLERY" Captain Johnson's Battery

Johnson's Battery, recruited in Bedford County, was organized in May, 1861, as an infantry company. Assigned to the 28th Regiment, it was transferred to the Virginia Artillery (Confederate) in September, 1861, with men from Dinwiddie County. On October 4, 1862, it disbanded and its 52 men were assigned to the Fauquier Light Artillery Companies. The battery was commanded by Captain John R. Johnson. On April 9, 1865, it surrendered with the Army of Northern Virginia.

Private W. T. Lewis at the Battle of Gettysburg July 1 - 3, 1863

June 30, 1863. WT (as he was called) Lewis was assigned to Captain Johnson's Artillery Battery.

June 30, 1783. Johnson's Battery remained with Dearing's Battalion along with the Richmond Hampden, Richmond Fayette, and Lynchburg Batteries. The Battalion traveled with General Pickett's Division of Longstreet's Corps into Pennsylvania.

July 1, 1863. In the early morning of July 1, 1863 Captain Johnson Artillery Battery arrived at Seminary Ridge near Gettysburg. The battery took up a position west of the Peach Orchard. They focused their fire on the Copse of Trees and firing off several cannon shots at the advancing Union skirmishers. The Union counter battery fire wounded four men and killed ten horses, however were forced to retreat after cannon fire, (see marker on the battlefield)

Private W. T. Lewis at the Battle of Gettysburg July 1 - 3, 1863 (Continued)

July 2, 1863 In line of battle all day. They maintained their position on Seminary Ridge. They drove back skirmishers with well placed shots. Several men were wounded and several horses killed. They maintained their position through the day and night.

July 3, 1863. Johnson's Artillery Battery remained in place on Seminary Ridge. Pickett's Division remained in Chambersburg securing General Lee's rear. Receiving orders to move on to Gettysburg, Pickett's Division arrived there the morning of July 3rd, 1863. They were led to their assigned position in line, just west of the Emmittsburg Pike.

Around 1 PM, Johnson's Battery received new orders for participating in the bombardment that preceded Pickett's Charge, the massive assault against the Union Line. The batteries were to focus their fires on a small clump of trees just south of Ziegler's Grove, 1000 yards away.

Around 2 PM, Pickett's charge began. The cannoners, (including WE Lewis), being out of ammunition, joined the charge toward Cemetery Hill. The Confederate Soldiers charged the Union line and in less than an hour, they had to withdraw after heavy casualties. The survivors came slowly back and General Lee's Confederate Army headed back to Virginia following a bitter battle and war changing defeat. Lewis returned to the 53rd VA.

53rd Virginia Volunteer Infantry Regiment

The 53rd Virginia Volunteer Infantry Regiment was an infantry regiment raised in Virginia for service in the Confederate States Army during the American Civil War. It fought mostly with the Army of Northern Virginia.

The 53rd Virginia was organized in December 1861, by consolidating Tomlin's and Montague's Battalions, and Waddill's Infantry Company. Many of the men were recruited in Halifax, New Kent, Charles City, and Pittsylvania counties. It was assigned to General Armistead's Brigade of the Army of Northern Virginia.

The unit was active from Seven Pines to Gettysburg, served in North Carolina, then fought at Drewry's Bluff and Cold Harbor. Later it participated in the long Petersburg siege north of the James River and the Appomattox Campaign.

This regiment contained 468 effectives in June, 1862, lost 31 of the 128 engaged at Malvern Hill, and reported 11 casualties during the Maryland Campaign. Of the 435 who saw action at Gettysburg more than thirty percent were disabled, and there were 3 killed, 33 wounded, and 3 missing at Drewry's Bluff. Six officers and seventy four men surrendered on April 9, 1865.

The field officers were Colonels William E. Starke, William R. Aylett, John Grammar, Jr., Carter L. Stevenson, and Harrison B. Tomlin; Lieutenant Colonels Rawley W. Martin, Edgar B. Montague, John C. Timberlake, and George M. Waddill; and Majors Henry A. Edmondson and William Leigh.

Then, according to orders, returned to camp near Suffolk; the distance marched was thirty-five miles. The company, at this time, is under marching orders with three days' rations prepared.

Stationed on Charles City Road, five miles below Richmond, May-June 1862.

May 8.— This company, in obedience to orders of Brigadier-General Armistead, marched from Suffolk to Providence Church, at which place it remained one night.

May 9.— From there to Zuni Station, a distance of fifteen miles, from thence to Ivor Station, a distance of eight miles.

May 23.— From there to Petersburg, a distance of forty miles.

May 28.— This company went to City Point on picket and remained.

May 31.— It returned to Petersburg.

June 1.— From there to Richmond, at which place it camped one night.

June 2.— Marched five miles below Richmond on the Williamsburg Road and remained there.

June 5.— They marched back to camp on the Richmond and York River Railroad.

June 18.— The company was in an engagement with the enemy. Lost none in killed or wounded.

June 25.— This company was in another engagement with the enemy at the same place. Lost none in killed or wounded.

June 28.— This company was in another engagement at the same place. Lost none in killed or wounded.

June 29.— This company marched five miles down on the Charles City Road and camped near Malvern Hill.

June 30.— The company was mustered for pay at Malvern Hill.

Stationed on Manassas Battlefield, July-August 1862.

July 1.— This company was engaged in the battle of Malvern Hill. Lost one sergeant killed, captain and one private wounded.

From there, in obedience to orders, marched twelve miles down on the Charles City Road and remained.

July 7.— Started back. Marched about fifteen miles and camped for the night.

July 8.— The march was continued about six miles and camped on the Darbytown Road.

July 11.— It crossed the James River to Falling Creek and there remained drilling.

August 16.— In obedience to orders it marched to Louisa Court-House, a distance of sixty-eight miles, and there remained.

August 19.— It continued to march until night; the distance marched fifteen miles.

August 20.— It marched twelve miles and camped.

August 21.— Marched to Strasburg, a distance of ten miles.

August 22.— From there it marched eight miles and camped for one night.

August 25.— From there went to the Rappahannock River on picket duty. The company was exposed to the fire of the enemy but lost no men.

August 26.— Went to Waterloo Ford, a distance of twelve miles, and camped near the river.

August 27.— From there to Salem, a distance of fourteen miles.

August 28.— Went to White Plains, a distance of five miles.

August 29.— From there to Manassas, a distance of twelve miles.

August 30.— It was engaged in the battle. Lost no men.

September 5.— We marched for Richmond. On the first day we reached Gordonsville; on the second day reached Louisa Court-House; on the third day we marched. We made the distance to Richmond, from thence on the same day to Petersburg, where we remained.

October 6.— We proceeded to Kinston, North Carolina. Here we remained.

Stationed near Kinston, North Carolina, November-December 1863.

November 1.— The company was in camp near Kinston, North Carolina.

November 2.— We were ordered back to Petersburg.

November 5.— Left by rail for Petersburg. Remained near Petersburg.

November 7.— It moved by railroad to Garysburg, North Carolina.

November 10.— Returned at night.

November 28.— Left for Hanover Junction and remained there.

December 10.— It returned to Petersburg and there remained.

December 12.— In the morning it was carried by rail to Kinston, North Carolina and then went into winter quarters.

July 2.— It was engaged in the battle at that place and camped near there.

July 5.— It marched with the rest of the regiment to Mount Gray in Charles City County, where it remained in camp.

July 8.— It marched with the rest of the regiment up near Richmond and camped.

July 11.— It marched across James River on the pontoon bridge and camped on the Richmond and Petersburg Turnpike, where it remained.

August 16.— It, with the regiment, marched to Richmond and took the cars to Louisa Court-House, where it camped.

August 19.— It marched in the direction of Orange Court-House.

August 26.— Came up with the enemy at Fauquier, White Sulphur Springs, where we had skirmishing with them. From this place we marched towards Manassas.

August 30.— We were exposed to the shelling of the enemy, while the battle was raging. Towards the close of the day we were ordered up and camped near the enemy's lines and remained there all night.

August 31.— The enemy had left. Took up camp on the battlefield.

None of this company was killed or wounded in any of the engagements. It has gone through a great deal of hardships, as well as the rest of the Army. The discipline of the company is good.

Stationed near Flint Hill, September-October 1862.

September 1.— This company marched from Manassas.

September 5.— Crossed the Potomac River into Maryland.

September 7-10.— Reached Frederick City, where it remained until September 10.

September 12.— This company reached the pass across the Potomac River at Harper's Ferry and defended it till the surrender of Harper's Ferry.

September 16.— At night this company marched from Harper's Ferry to Shepherdstown and crossed the Potomac into Maryland.

September 19.— In the morning it crossed the river back into Virginia and camped near Martinsburg.

September 28.— It camped near Winchester and remained there.

October 9.— It was detailed on provost guard at Winchester, where it remained.

October 30.— It rejoined the regiment on its march to Culpeper Court-House.

The discipline of the company is good.

Stationed near Guiney's Station, November-December 1862.

November 1.— This company was on the march from Winchester to Culpeper Court-House.

November 3.— It arrived at Culpeper Court-House and camped there.

November 28.— Marched within two miles of Fredericksburg, Virginia and went into camp and remained there.

December 12.— It was put in line of battle.

December 13.— The enemy attacked our left and right wing but was repulsed. No casualties in this company. The company went into camp and remained.

December 27.— It marched up near Guiney's Station and camped, where it remains now.

Stationed at Chester, Virginia, January-February 1863.

January 1.— This company was in camp near Guiney's Station, Virginia, where it remained.

February 15.— It started on the march toward Richmond.

February 19.— Passed through Richmond.

February 21.— In the evening we took up camp near Chester Station on the Richmond and Petersburg Railroad, where it remains at this time.

The discipline of the company is good.

Stationed at fortifications near Suffolk, Virginia, March-April 1863.

March 1.— This company left camp near Chester Station on the Richmond and Petersburg Turnpike. Marched through Petersburg and camped four miles from that place in Prince George County, Virginia, where it remained.

March 19.— It started on the march to Fort Powhatan.

March 20.— It reached there and remained.

April 2.— It started to Ivor Station.

April 3.— Reached Ivor Station and camped there.

April 9.— It started to Franklin Station.

April 10.— Crossed the pontoon bridge (over the Blackwater River) near that place and marched towards Suffolk, Virginia and camped on the Somerton Road.

April 13.— We were in line of battle and had some skirmishing with the enemy. We remained on the road in line of battle.

April 26.— We marched about four miles down on the White Marsh Road, where it remains now.

Stationed at station, Chambersburg, Pennsylvania, May-June 1863.

[For record of events, see Company D.]

June 15.— Marched in the direction of Ashby's Gap in the Blue Ridge; thence to Snicker's Gap across the mountain.

Stationed at camp near Orange Court-House, Virginia, July-August 1863.

July 2.— This company left our camp near Chambersburg under a forced march of twenty-eight miles to Cashtown.

July 3.— We marched to the vicinity of Gettysburg and remained with Pickett's Division in line of battle until 2 p.m., when our portion of the line was ordered forward. After a severe engagement with the enemy, we were forced to fall back with the division losing sixteen men taken prisoners and one wounded during the action.

July 4.— Took up the line of march to Williamsport, Maryland.

July 7.— We arrived at Williamsport with the Yankee prisoners, having marched a distance of forty miles.

July 13.— Crossed the Potomac. Marched to Martinsburg, a distance of fifteen miles.

July 15.— Marched to Bunker Hill, a distance of ten miles.

July 19.— We took up the line of march to Culpeper Court-House.

July 24.— Arrived at Culpeper Court-House, having marched a distance of eighty miles.

August 3.— Marched to Rapidan Station, distance of eleven miles.

August 5.— Marched eight miles and camped near Orange Court-House, where we now remain.

Stationed near Kinston, North Carolina, September-October 1863.

[For record of events, see Company A.]

September 12.— We arrived at Richmond at 8 p.m., distance about eighty miles. Took the train at that place for Petersburg.

September 13.— We arrived at 1 a.m., a distance of twenty-two miles. Remained there in camp.

October 1.— We took the — for Kinston, North Carolina.

October 7.— We arrived at Kinston at 11 o'clock, distance 180 miles, where we now remain.

Stationed near Kinston, North Carolina, November-December 1863.

November 3.— This company left their quarters near Kinston, North Carolina.

November 4.— Arrived at Petersburg. Went into camp east of the city, a distance of 184 miles.

November 7.— Left camp near Petersburg.

November 8.— Arrived at Garysburg, a distance of sixty-nine miles.

November 9.— Went on picket, a distance of six miles. Remained there.

November 10.— Returned to camp near Garysburg the same day, distance of six miles. Left camp near Garysburg.

November 11.— Arrived in camp four miles east of Petersburg, a distance of sixty-nine miles. Remained there.

November 27.— Took up the line of march for Hanover Junction.

November 28.— Arrived there at 11 p.m., a distance of forty-nine miles. Remained there.

December 9.— It took up the line of march for Kinston, North Carolina.

December 13.— It arrived at Kinston, a distance of 235 miles, where we now remain.

No casualties in this company.

Stationed near Fort Howlett, July-August 1864.

July 1.— This company was in line of battle in front of Bermuda Hundred, where it now remains.

No casualties in this company.

Company H (Mattapony Guards)

Stationed at Camp No. 3 near Sandy Cross, North Carolina, March-April 1862.

[For record of events, see Company D.]

March 6.— Marched twenty-six miles.

Stationed at camp near Malvern Hill, May-June 1862.

May 1.— This company was encamped at Sandy Cross, North Carolina.

May 2.— It marched eight miles to Perquiman's River in the direction of Camden Court-House.

May 3.— We were ordered to march back to Suffolk, a distance of thirty or forty miles, which was accomplished in less than a day and a half.

May 4.— Arrived at Camp Randolph.

May 5.— An election for officers was held, which resulted in the reelection of W. G. Pollard, Captain; J. L. Latane, First Lieutenant; M. H. Burruss, Second Lieutenant; and James I. Sale, Third Lieutenant.

May 8.— Left Camp Randolph and marched five miles on the Petersburg Road.

May 9.— Marched twenty miles to Zuni, a station on the Norfolk and Petersburg Railroad. Remained at Zuni.

May 18.— We marched to Ivor on the same road, a distance of six miles. Remained at Ivor.

May 24.— Embarked on the cars for Petersburg and arrived at that place same day. Marched to camp about four miles from town near New Market Race Course at Camp Hall. Remained at Camp Hall.

May 29.— We marched to Petersburg and late in the evening of same day we embarked on the cars of Richmond. Arrived in Richmond at 11 o'clock same night. Slept on the Capitol Square.

May 30.— In the morning at an early hour we marched to camp near Oakwood Cemetery. Remained in camp.

May 31.— We were ordered to the front in the direction of what afterwards served [as] the battlefield of Seven Pines. We were held in reserve that day.

180 at Second Manassas. It lost forty-eight percent of the 355 engaged at Chancellorsville and more than fifty percent of the 257 at Gettysburg. The regiment surrendered with 7 officers and 38 men of which only 17 were armed. Its field officers were Colonels James T. Preston, Charles A. Ronald, and William Terry; Lieutenant Colonels Robert D. Gardner and Lewis T. Moore; and Majors Matthew D. Bennett, Joseph F. Kent, and Albert G. Pendleton.

5th Cavalry Regiment was organized in June, 1862, using the 2nd Battalion Virginia Cavalry as its nucleus. The men were from Petersburg and Fairfax, Gloucester, King and Queen, Mathews, Randolph, and James City counties. It was assigned to W. H. F. Lee's, F. Lee's, Lomax's, and Payne's Brigade, Army of Northern Virginia. The unit participated in the Seven Days' Battles, the Second Manassas and Maryland campaigns, and the conflicts at Fredericksburg, Brandy Station, Upperville, Gettysburg, Bristoe, and Mine Run. Later it was involved at The Wilderness and Cold Harbor, and in Early's Shenandoah Valley operations. On November 8, 1864, it was consolidated with the 15th Virginia Cavalry Regiment and redesignated the 5th Regiment Virginia Cavalry Consolidated. This command took part in the defense of Petersburg and saw action around Appomattox. Only 150 men were engaged at Gettysburg and 2 surrendered at Appomattox as most cut through the Federal lines and disbanded. The field officers were Colonels Reuben B. Boston, H. Clay Pate, and Thomas L. Rosser; Lieutenant Colonel James H. Allen; and Majors Beverly B. Douglas, John Eells, Cyrus Harding, Jr., and John W. Puller.

5th Cavalry Regiment, Provisional Army was organized near Norfolk, Virginia, in July, 1861. The men were recruited at Petersburg and in the counties of Princess Anne, Sussex, Surry, Prince George, Nansemond, and Southampton. It served in the Department of Norfolk until May, 1862, when three companies were assigned to the 14th Battalion and seven companies merged into the 16th Battalion Virginia Cavalry. Majors Benjamin Allston and John Mullins were in command.

5th Infantry Battalion completed its organization at Richmond, Virginia, in May, 1861. Its six companies were raised in the counties of Brunswick, Dinwiddie, Prince George, Henrico, and Greenville. The unit served as heavy artillery along the James River before being attached to General Armistead's Brigade. During June, 1862, it contained 213 men, was active in the Seven Days' Battles, then disbanded

in September. Many of its members transferred to the 53rd Regiment Virginia Infantry. The field officers were Lieutenant Colonel F. H. Archer, and Majors William R. Foster and John P. Wilson, Jr.

5th Infantry Regiment was organized in May, 1861, under Colonel K. Harper. Eight companies were from Augusta County and two from Frederick County. The unit became part of the Stonewall Brigade and served under Generals T. J. Jackson, R. B. Garnett, Winder, Paxton, J. A. Walker, and W. Terry. It saw action at First Manassas, First Kernstown, and in Jackson's Valley Campaign. Later the 5th participated in the campaigns of the Army of Northern Virginia from the Seven Days' Battles to Cold Harbor, then was active in Early's Shenandoah Valley operations and around Appomattox. It reported 9 killed, 48 wounded, and 4 missing at First Kernstown, had 4 killed, 89 wounded, and 20 missing at Cross Keys and Port Republic, and suffered 14 killed and 91 wounded at Second Manassas. The unit sustained 120 casualties at Chancellorsville and of the 345 engaged at Gettysburg, sixteen percent were disabled. It surrendered 8 officers and 48 men. The field officers were Colonels William S. H. Baylor, John H. S. Funk, William H. Harman, and Kenton Harper; Lieutenant Colonel Hazel J. Williams; and Majors Absalom Koiner and James W. Newton.

6th Cavalry Regiment completed its organization in November, 1861, at Manassas, Virginia. Men of this unit were raised in Loudoun, Rappahannock, Clarke, Rockingham, Pittsylvania, Fairfax, Halifax, Fauquier, and Orange counties. The unit served in Robertson's, W. E. Jones', Lomax's, and Payne's Brigade, Army of Northern Virginia. It fought in Jackson's Valley Campaign and in the conflicts at Second Manassas, Brandy Station, Upperville, Fairfield, Bristoe, Mine Run, The Wilderness, Todd's Tavern, Spotsylvania, Haw's Shop, and Cold Harbor. The regiment went on to take part in Early's Shenandoah Valley operations and the Appomattox Campaign. Only 3 men surrendered on April 9, 1865, as most of the cavalry cut through the Federal lines and later disbanded. The field officers were Colonels Charles W. Field, Thomas S. Flournoy, John S. Green, and Julien Harrison; Lieutenant Colonels J. Grattan Cabell and Daniel T. Richards; and Majors Cabell E. Flournoy and Daniel A. Grimsley.

6th Infantry Regiment, organized at Norfolk, Virginia, in May, 1861, recruited its men at Norfolk and in the counties of Princess Anne, Nansemond, and Chesterfield. It served in the Department of

ginia, saw action at Carnifax Ferry, then returned to Tennessee where it was involved in the Knoxville Campaign. The unit went on to fight in numerous conflicts in the Shenandoah Valley and sometime around April 15, 1865, disbanded. It reported 9 killed, 43 wounded, and 5 missing at Fort Donelson, and 3 killed and 16 wounded at Fayetteville. Only a handful remained after the Battle of Waynesborough. The field officers were Colonels Augustus Forsberg and Gabriel C. Wharton; Lieutenant Colonels George A. Cunningham, James W. Massie, and John P. Wolfe; and Majors William T. Akers, Stephen M. Dickey, D. P. Graham, D. S. Hounshell, and William A. Yonce.

52nd Infantry Regiment was organized at Staunton, Virginia, in August, 1861. Many of its members were from Augusta County. It fought at Greenbrier River and Camp Alleghany, and later in Jackson's Valley Campaign. The unit was then assigned to Early's, W. Smith's, Pegram's, and J. A. Walker's Brigade in the Army of Northern Virginia. It participated in various conflicts from the Seven Days' Battles to Cold Harbor, marched with Early to the Shenandoah Valley, and was active around Appomattox. This regiment lost 2 wounded and 6 missing at Camp Alleghany, had 7 killed and 46 wounded at McDowell, and suffered 14 killed and 87 wounded at Cross Keys and Port Republic. It reported 29 casualties at Gaines' Mill, 61 at Second Manassas, 13 at Fredericksburg, and 12 at Chancellorsville. Of the 254 engaged at Gettysburg, six percent were disabled. On April 9, 1865, it surrendered with 7 officers and 53 men of which 14 were armed. The field officers were Colonels John B. Baldwin, Michael G. Harman, and James H. Skinner; and Lieutenant Colonels John D. Lilley, John D. H. Ross, and Thomas H. Watkins.

53rd Infantry Regiment was organized in December, 1861, by consolidating Tomlin's and Montague's Battalions, and Waddill's Infantry Company. Many of the men were recruited in Halifax, New Kent, Charles City, and Pittsylvania counties. It was assigned to General Armistead's, Barton's, and Steuart's Brigade, Army of Northern Virginia. The unit was active from Seven Pines to Gettysburg, served in North Carolina, then fought at Drewry's Bluff and Cold Harbor. Later it participated in the long Petersburg siege north of the James River and the Appomattox Campaign. This regiment contained 468 effectives in June, 1862, lost 31 of the 128 engaged at Malvern Hill, and reported 11 casualties during the Maryland Campaign. Of the 435 who saw action at Gettysburg more than thirty percent were disabled, and there were 3 killed, 33 wounded, and 3 missing at Drewry's Bluff.

Many were captured at Sayler's Creek, and 6 officers and 74 men surrendered on April 9, 1865. The field officers were Colonels William R. Aylett, John Grammer, Jr., Carter L. Stevenson, and Harrison B. Tomlin; Lieutenant Colonels Rawley W. Martin, Edgar B. Montague, John C. Timberlake, and George M. Waddill; and Majors Henry A. Edmundson and William Leigh.

54th Infantry Battalion was organized on April 9, 1865, with nine companies. It was formed by consolidating detachments of the 54th and 63rd Regiments Virginia Infantry. The unit was attached to General Pettus' Brigade and surrendered with the Army of Tennessee on April 26. Lieutenant Colonel Connally H. Lynch was in command.

54th Infantry Regiment was organized in October, 1861. It was soon ordered to Kentucky and took an active part in the engagement at Middle Creek. Later the unit was assigned to Trigg's, Reynolds', Brown's and Reynolds' Consolidated, and Palmer's Brigade, Army of Tennessee. It participated in many battles of the army from Chickamauga to Atlanta, endured Hood's winter operations, and fought in North Carolina. On April 9, 1865, it merged into the 54th Battalion Virginia Infantry. This regiment sustained 47 casualties at Chickamauga, totalled 390 men and 329 arms in December, 1863, and had 128 present in December, 1864 and 212 in January, 1865. The field officers were Colonel Robert C. Trigg; Lieutenant Colonels Henry A. Edmundson, William B. Shelor, and John J. Wade; and Majors John S. Deyerle, Austin Harman, and James C. Taylor.

55th Infantry Regiment was organized in September, 1861, by the addition of four companies to W. N. Ward's "Essex and Middlesex" Battalion of Virginia Volunteers. It was assigned to General Field's, Heth's, H. H. Walker's, and Barton's Brigade, Army of Northern Virginia. The 55th participated in the campaigns of the army from the Seven Days' Battles to Cold Harbor, then was involved in the Petersburg siege south of the James River and the Appomattox operations. It sustained 108 casualties during the Seven Days' Battles, 32 at Second Manassas, 11 at Fredericksburg, and 110 at Chancellorsville. Of the 268 engaged at Gettysburg, twelve percent were killed, wounded, or missing. In February, 1865, the 47th and 55th Regiments were consolidated, but only 2 officers and 21 men of the 55th were present at the surrender. Its field officers were Colonels William S. Christian and Francis Mallory; Lieutenant Colonels Robert H. Archer and Evan

erations against Petersburg. Early in 1865 the battery ceased to exist, but 2 of its members surrendered at Appomattox. Captains Alex Hankins and Lucien W. Richardson were in command.

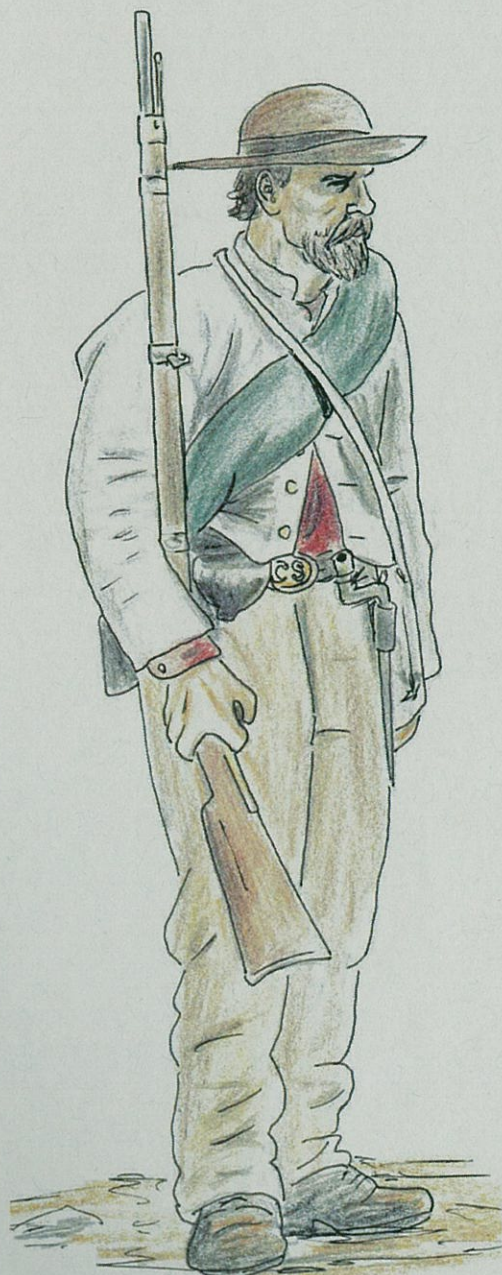
Johnson's-Clutter's Battery [also called Jackson's Flying Artillery] was organized at Richmond, Virginia, during March, 1862, with men from Richmond. The unit was assigned to R. L. Walker's, D. G. McIntosh's, and M. Johnson's Battalion of Artillery, Army of Northern Virginia. It served with the army from the Seven Days' Battles to Cold Harbor, was active in the operations at Petersburg, and ended the war at Appomattox. The battery had 96 men at Gettysburg and surrendered with 1 officer and 55 men. Its captains were Valentine J. Clutter and Marmaduke Johnson.

Johnston Heavy Artillery was organized in September, 1861, with men from Dinwiddie County. Reorganized in 1862 under the same captain, the unit was stationed for some time at Drewry's Bluff attached to F. W. Smith's Battalion. During February, 1864, it was serving as infantry and in May belonged to Ransom's Brigade in the Richmond and Petersburg lines. On April 9, 1865, it surrendered with the Army of Northern Virginia. Captain Branch J. Epes was in command.

King William Light Artillery was formed in the spring of 1861 with men raised in King William County. The battery served in T. H. Carter's, R. C. M. Page's, and W. E. Cutshaw's Battalion of Artillery. It participated in various conflicts from Seven Pines to Cold Harbor, moved with Early to the Shenandoah Valley, and was active around Appomattox. The unit reported 3 wounded at Gaines' Mill, 6 casualties during the Maryland Campaign, and twenty-two percent of the 103 engaged at Gettysburg disabled. It surrendered with 1 officer and 22 men. Captains Thomas H. Carter and William P. Carter were its commanders.

Latham's-Blount's Battery completed its organization at Lynchburg, Virginia, in April, 1861. After taking an active part in the Battle of First Manassas, the unit was assigned to J. Dearing's, H. P. Jones', J. P. W. Read's (38th Battalion), and R. M. Stribling's Battalion of Artillery. It fought with the Army of Northern Virginia from Williamsburg to Gettysburg, moved to North Carolina, and later was involved in the Plymouth expedition. Returning to Virginia, it was active on the Bermuda Hundred line and saw action at Cold Harbor and in front of Petersburg. It sustained 10 casualties of the 96 engaged at Gettysburg, and many were captured at Rice's Station on April 6, 1865. It



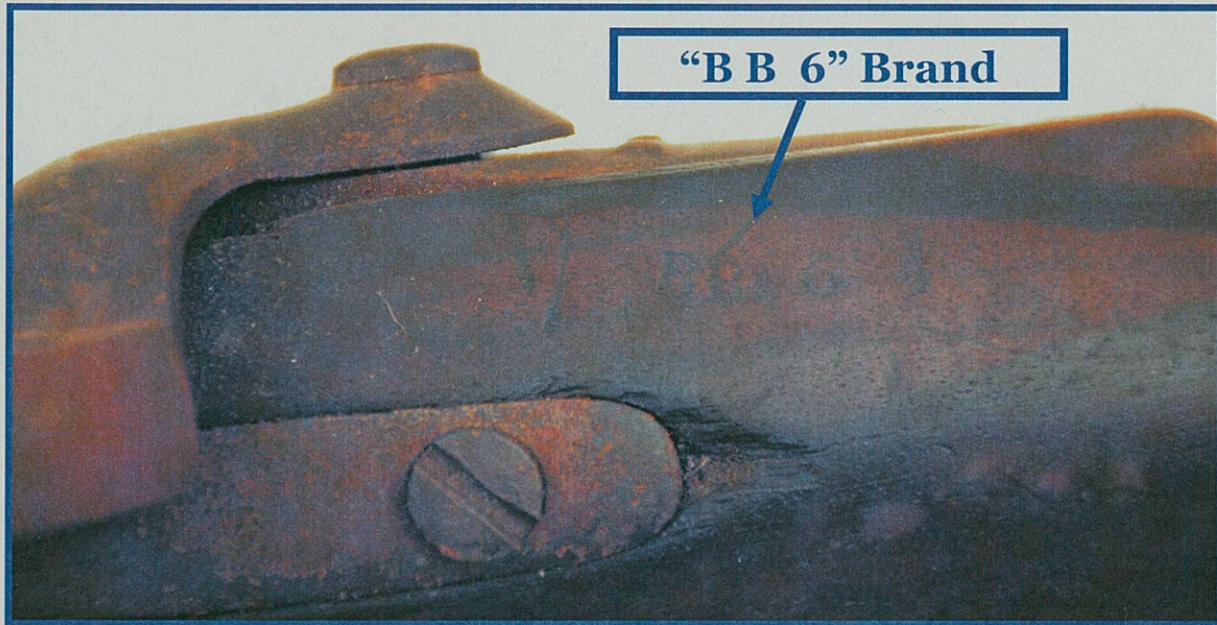

In 1857, President Buchanan appointed John Floyd to be his Secretary of War, a post Floyd resigned during the secession crisis of December, 1860. Floyd, who became a Confederate General, was indicted because of having overseen the transfer of thousands of arms to the Southern States.

The US Pattern 1816 were basically an obsolete US flintlock muskets and were the primary weapon sent to the southern arsenals for conversion to percussion. This musket is a southern arsenal conversion and bears the brand "**B B 6**" perhaps for **BARHAMSVILLE GREY'S, CO. B** of the Confederate Army in which Private Joseph L. Lewis served.

Given the type of conversion, the type of cock used and the placement of the nipple, this musket was converted at a southern arsenal and may well have been a Confederate conversion after the beginning of the Civil War.

"Private Joseph L. Lewis at the Battle of Gettysburg July 2 - 3, 1863

On the afternoon of July 2, 1863, Company B (Chatham Grey's) reached an area near Seminary Ridge near Gettysburg to become a part of Pickett's Division. On the morning of July 3rd Company B waited in the trees bordering Seminary Ridge. Joseph L. Lewis with Company B (Chatham Grey's) was present and waiting with his company for what is known as Pickett's Charge.

At 2 PM on July 3rd, Pickett's Division marched across farmland near Gettysburg toward Cemetery Ridge where a few hundred Confederate Soldiers crested Cemetery Ridge in what became known as the "high water mark of the Confederacy". Soon the Confederate attack collapsed as Pickett's Division suffered heavy losses inflicted by the Union Army. Retreat to Virginia followed.

Following his march back to Virginia, Joseph L. Lewis became ill and was absent from duty from 25 July, 1863, until 2 November, 1863. Joseph L. Lewis joined the Chatham Grey's on 3 November, 1863.

53rd Virginia Volunteer Infantry Regiment

The 53rd Virginia Volunteer Infantry Regiment was an infantry regiment raised in Virginia for service in the Confederate States Army during the American Civil War. It fought mostly with the Army of Northern Virginia.

The 53rd Virginia was organized in December 1861, by consolidating Tomlin's and Montague's Battalions, and Waddill's Infantry Company. Many of the men were recruited in Halifax, New Kent, Charles City, and Pittsylvania counties. It was assigned to General Armistead's Brigade of the Army of Northern Virginia.

The unit was active from Seven Pines to Gettysburg, served in North Carolina, then fought at Drewry's Bluff and Cold Harbor. Later it participated in the long Petersburg siege north of the James River and the Appomattox Campaign.

This regiment contained 468 effectives in June, 1862, lost 31 of the 128 engaged at Malvern Hill, and reported 11 casualties during the Maryland Campaign. Of the 435 who saw action at Gettysburg more than thirty percent were disabled, and there were 3 killed, 33 wounded, and 3 missing at Drewry's Bluff. Six officers and seventy four men surrendered on April 9, 1865.

The field officers were Colonels William E. Starke, William R. Aylett, John Grammar, Jr., Carter L. Stevenson, and Harrison B. Tomlin; Lieutenant Colonels Rawley W. Martin, Edgar B. Montague, John C. Timberlake, and George M. Waddill; and Majors Henry A. Edmondson and William Leigh.

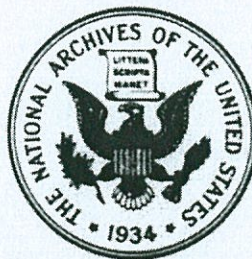

Marched thence to the neighborhood of Winchester encamping about six miles in a northerly direction from that town.

November 1.— This company left Warrenton County and marched a distance of sixteen miles in Culpeper County and camped.

December 22.— Went on picket below Fredericksburg.

December 27.— Marched to camp near Guiney's Station, a distance of nine miles.

From that place we marched through the counties of Caroline, King and Queen and King William and returned by Hanover Junction (fifty) miles, and continued the march to Culpeper Court-House (seventy-three) miles via Martinsburg (seventy-five) miles and crossed the Potomac at Williamsport (five) miles into the state of Maryland.

June 25.— It continued the march through Hagerstown (fifteen) miles, then through Middleburg (eight) miles into the state of Pennsylvania through Green Castle (sixteen) miles and encamped near Chambersburg (twenty) miles, Pennsylvania.

Stationed near Petersburg, Virginia, July-August 1863.

July 1.— This company and regiment, in obedience to orders, were sent on picket about (three) or (four) miles from Chambersburg, Pennsylvania.

July 2.— Took up a line of march for Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, a distance of (twenty) miles.

July 3.— We arrived at Gettysburg in time to engage in the battle.

July 4.— Took charge of the prisoners and conducted them to Williamsport; marched a distance (forty-five or fifty) miles and remained there.

July 13.— Crossed the Potomac and marched to Bunker Hill, [West] Virginia, a distance of about twenty-three miles, and encamped for a short time, from there we marched to Culpeper

Court-House, a distance of about (seventy) miles, from there to camp between Rapidan River and Orange Court-House, a distance of (twelve) miles, where we mustered for pay.

Stationed near Kinston, North Carolina, September-October 1863.

This company, in obedience to orders, marched from Orange County, Virginia to Richmond, Virginia in five days, a distance of (ninety) miles, where we took the cars at the Richmond and Petersburg Depot.

September 13.— We arrived at Petersburg about 2 a.m. on Saturday morning. We remained around Petersburg.

October 6.— The said company took the cars at Petersburg, Virginia.

October 7.— The company arrived at Kinston, North Carolina, at night, a distance of (180) miles, where we are encamped.

Stationed near Kinston, North Carolina, November-December 1863.

November 1.— This company was encamped about three miles from Kinston, North Carolina and remained in camp.

November 3.— We were ordered to take the cars at Kinston, North Carolina.

November 4.— We reported at Petersburg, distance from Kinston to Petersburg, 170 miles. We remained at Petersburg.

November 7.— Took the cars at Petersburg for Garysburg, North Carolina, a distance of sixty miles, where we remained three days and returned to Petersburg, where we remained.

November 28.— Took the cars for Hanover Junction, distance forty-six miles. We remained at Hanover Junction.

December 9.— Took the cars for Kinston, North Carolina. Stopped in Petersburg two days.

December 13.— We arrived at Kinston, where we are at present time.

Stationed near Bermuda Hundred, April 30-August 31, 1864.

May 2.— This company, in obedience to orders, marched from Tunstall's Station near Hanover Junction, distance twenty-five miles, and remained near Hanover Junction.

May 6.— We left on the cars for Richmond; thence to Drewry's Bluff, where we remained.

May 10.— We were engaged with the enemy. Casualties in the company were two wounded. We were ordered from this place to Richmond and remained a short time and then came back to Drewry's Bluff.

May 16.— We engaged the enemy again near Drewry's Bluff. Casualties in the company, one.

May 20.— We started for Spotsylvania Court-House, distance (seventy) miles.

May 22.— We returned to Hanover Junction, distance (forty) miles and remained at said place on line of battle in Hanover County.

June 16.— We then crossed the James River in Chesterfield County.

June 17.— We were engaged with the enemy. Casualties, none. We remained in Chesterfield to June 30, 1864.

Company C (Old Dominion Riflemen)

Stationed at York River Railroad, May-June 1862.

Formerly Company D, Montague's Battalion, Virginia Infantry.

Stationed at Manassas, July-August 1862.

Stationed near Culpeper Court-House, September-October 1862.

The company wasn't in the engagement at Harper's Ferry.

It was held as reserve. It was present at Sharpsburg. Nothing with note occurred.

September 6.— Marched from Leesburg into Maryland.

September 9.— Marched to Frederick Junction.

From Frederick Junction to through Frederick City to Middletown. Remained there one day.

September 11.— From Middletown to the Potomac River near Harper's Ferry.

September 15, 17.— Generally held as reserve in Maryland.

Marched from the Potomac River into Virginia towards Martinsburg, from Martinsburg towards Winchester. Remained at Winchester until towards the last of October.

October 28.— Marched from near Winchester to Culpeper Court-House, three days' march.

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180 at Second Manassas. It lost forty-eight percent of the 355 engaged at Chancellorsville and more than fifty percent of the 257 at Gettysburg. The regiment surrendered with 7 officers and 38 men of which only 17 were armed. Its field officers were Colonels James T. Preston, Charles A. Ronald, and William Terry; Lieutenant Colonels Robert D. Gardner and Lewis T. Moore; and Majors Matthew D. Bennett, Joseph F. Kent, and Albert G. Pendleton.

5th Cavalry Regiment was organized in June, 1862, using the 2nd Battalion Virginia Cavalry as its nucleus. The men were from Petersburg and Fairfax, Gloucester, King and Queen, Mathews, Randolph, and James City counties. It was assigned to W. H. F. Lee's, F. Lee's, Lomax's, and Payne's Brigade, Army of Northern Virginia. The unit participated in the Seven Days' Battles, the Second Manassas and Maryland campaigns, and the conflicts at Fredericksburg, Brandy Station, Upperville, Gettysburg, Bristoe, and Mine Run. Later it was involved at The Wilderness and Cold Harbor, and in Early's Shenandoah Valley operations. On November 8, 1864, it was consolidated with the 15th Virginia Cavalry Regiment and redesignated the 5th Regiment Virginia Cavalry Consolidated. This command took part in the defense of Petersburg and saw action around Appomattox. Only 150 men were engaged at Gettysburg and 2 surrendered at Appomattox as most cut through the Federal lines and disbanded. The field officers were Colonels Reuben B. Boston, H. Clay Pate, and Thomas L. Rosser; Lieutenant Colonel James H. Allen; and Majors Beverly B. Douglas, John Eells, Cyrus Harding, Jr., and John W. Puller.

5th Cavalry Regiment, Provisional Army was organized near Norfolk, Virginia, in July, 1861. The men were recruited at Petersburg and in the counties of Princess Anne, Sussex, Surry, Prince George, Nansemond, and Southampton. It served in the Department of Norfolk until May, 1862, when three companies were assigned to the 14th Battalion and seven companies merged into the 16th Battalion Virginia Cavalry. Majors Benjamin Allston and John Mullins were in command.

5th Infantry Battalion completed its organization at Richmond, Virginia, in May, 1861. Its six companies were raised in the counties of Brunswick, Dinwiddie, Prince George, Henrico, and Greensville. The unit served as heavy artillery along the James River before being attached to General Armistead's Brigade. During June, 1862, it contained 213 men, was active in the Seven Days' Battles, then disbanded

in September. Many of its members transferred to the 53rd Regiment Virginia Infantry. The field officers were Lieutenant Colonel F. H. Archer, and Majors William R. Foster and John P. Wilson, Jr.

5th Infantry Regiment was organized in May, 1861, under Colonel K. Harper. Eight companies were from Augusta County and two from Frederick County. The unit became part of the Stonewall Brigade and served under Generals T. J. Jackson, R. B. Garnett, Winder, Paxton, J. A. Walker, and W. Terry. It saw action at First Manassas, First Kernstown, and in Jackson's Valley Campaign. Later the 5th participated in the campaigns of the Army of Northern Virginia from the Seven Days' Battles to Cold Harbor, then was active in Early's Shenandoah Valley operations and around Appomattox. It reported 9 killed, 48 wounded, and 4 missing at First Kernstown, had 4 killed, 89 wounded, and 20 missing at Cross Keys and Port Republic, and suffered 14 killed and 91 wounded at Second Manassas. The unit sustained 120 casualties at Chancellorsville and of the 345 engaged at Gettysburg, sixteen percent were disabled. It surrendered 8 officers and 48 men. The field officers were Colonels William S. H. Baylor, John H. S. Funk, William H. Harman, and Kenton Harper; Lieutenant Colonel Hazel J. Williams; and Majors Absalom Koiner and James W. Newton.

6th Cavalry Regiment completed its organization in November, 1861, at Manassas, Virginia. Men of this unit were raised in Loudoun, Rappahannock, Clarke, Rockingham, Pittsylvania, Fairfax, Halifax, Fauquier, and Orange counties. The unit served in Robertson's, W. E. Jones', Lomax's, and Payne's Brigade, Army of Northern Virginia. It fought in Jackson's Valley Campaign and in the conflicts at Second Manassas, Brandy Station, Upperville, Fairfield, Bristoe, Mine Run, The Wilderness, Todd's Tavern, Spotsylvania, Haw's Shop, and Cold Harbor. The regiment went on to take part in Early's Shenandoah Valley operations and the Appomattox Campaign. Only 3 men surrendered on April 9, 1865, as most of the cavalry cut through the Federal lines and later disbanded. The field officers were Colonels Charles W. Field, Thomas S. Flournoy, John S. Green, and Julien Harrison; Lieutenant Colonels J. Grattan Cabell and Daniel T. Richards; and Majors Cabell E. Flournoy and Daniel A. Grimsley.

6th Infantry Regiment, organized at Norfolk, Virginia, in May, 1861, recruited its men at Norfolk and in the counties of Princess Anne, Nansemond, and Chesterfield. It served in the Department of

ginia, saw action at Carnifax Ferry, then returned to Tennessee where it was involved in the Knoxville Campaign. The unit went on to fight in numerous conflicts in the Shenandoah Valley and sometime around April 15, 1865, disbanded. It reported 9 killed, 43 wounded, and 5 missing at Fort Donelson, and 3 killed and 16 wounded at Fayetteville. Only a handful remained after the Battle of Waynesborough. The field officers were Colonels Augustus Forsberg and Gabriel C. Wharton; Lieutenant Colonels George A. Cunningham, James W. Massie, and John P. Wolfe; and Majors William T. Akers, Stephen M. Dickey, D. P. Graham, D. S. Hounshell, and William A. Yonce.

52nd Infantry Regiment was organized at Staunton, Virginia, in August, 1861. Many of its members were from Augusta County. It fought at Greenbrier River and Camp Alleghany, and later in Jackson's Valley Campaign. The unit was then assigned to Early's, W. Smith's, Pegram's, and J. A. Walker's Brigade in the Army of Northern Virginia. It participated in various conflicts from the Seven Days' Battles to Cold Harbor, marched with Early to the Shenandoah Valley, and was active around Appomattox. This regiment lost 2 wounded and 6 missing at Camp Alleghany, had 7 killed and 46 wounded at McDowell, and suffered 14 killed and 87 wounded at Cross Keys and Port Republic. It reported 29 casualties at Gaines' Mill, 61 at Second Manassas, 13 at Fredericksburg, and 12 at Chancellorsville. Of the 254 engaged at Gettysburg, six percent were disabled. On April 9, 1865, it surrendered with 7 officers and 53 men of which 14 were armed. The field officers were Colonels John B. Baldwin, Michael G. Harman, and James H. Skinner; and Lieutenant Colonels John D. Lilley, John D. H. Ross, and Thomas H. Watkins.

53rd Infantry Regiment was organized in December, 1861, by consolidating Tomlin's and Montague's Battalions, and Waddill's Infantry Company. Many of the men were recruited in Halifax, New Kent, Charles City, and Pittsylvania counties. It was assigned to General Armistead's, Barton's, and Steuart's Brigade, Army of Northern Virginia. The unit was active from Seven Pines to Gettysburg, served in North Carolina, then fought at Drewry's Bluff and Cold Harbor. Later it participated in the long Petersburg siege north of the James River and the Appomattox Campaign. This regiment contained 468 effectives in June, 1862, lost 31 of the 128 engaged at Malvern Hill, and reported 11 casualties during the Maryland Campaign. Of the 435 who saw action at Gettysburg more than thirty percent were disabled, and there were 3 killed, 33 wounded, and 3 missing at Drewry's Bluff.

Many were captured at Saylor's Creek, and 6 officers and 74 men surrendered on April 9, 1865. The field officers were Colonels William R. Aylett, John Grammer, Jr., Carter L. Stevenson, and Harrison B. Tomlin; Lieutenant Colonels Rawley W. Martin, Edgar B. Montague, John C. Timberlake, and George M. Waddill; and Majors Henry A. Edmundson and William Leigh.

54th Infantry Battalion was organized on April 9, 1865, with nine companies. It was formed by consolidating detachments of the 54th and 63rd Regiments Virginia Infantry. The unit was attached to General Pettus' Brigade and surrendered with the Army of Tennessee on April 26. Lieutenant Colonel Connally H. Lynch was in command.

54th Infantry Regiment was organized in October, 1861. It was soon ordered to Kentucky and took an active part in the engagement at Middle Creek. Later the unit was assigned to Trigg's, Reynolds', Brown's and Reynolds' Consolidated, and Palmer's Brigade, Army of Tennessee. It participated in many battles of the army from Chickamauga to Atlanta, endured Hood's winter operations, and fought in North Carolina. On April 9, 1865, it merged into the 54th Battalion Virginia Infantry. This regiment sustained 47 casualties at Chickamauga, totalled 390 men and 329 arms in December, 1863, and had 128 present in December, 1864 and 212 in January, 1865. The field officers were Colonel Robert C. Trigg; Lieutenant Colonels Henry A. Edmundson, William B. Shelor, and John J. Wade; and Majors John S. Deyerle, Austin Harman, and James C. Taylor.

55th Infantry Regiment was organized in September, 1861, by the addition of four companies to W. N. Ward's "Essex and Middlesex" Battalion of Virginia Volunteers. It was assigned to General Field's, Heth's, H. H. Walker's, and Barton's Brigade, Army of Northern Virginia. The 55th participated in the campaigns of the army from the Seven Days' Battles to Cold Harbor, then was involved in the Petersburg siege south of the James River and the Appomattox operations. It sustained 108 casualties during the Seven Days' Battles, 32 at Second Manassas, 11 at Fredericksburg, and 110 at Chancellorsville. Of the 268 engaged at Gettysburg, twelve percent were killed, wounded, or missing. In February, 1865, the 47th and 55th Regiments were consolidated, but only 2 officers and 21 men of the 55th were present at the surrender. Its field officers were Colonels William S. Christian and Francis Mallory; Lieutenant Colonels Robert H. Archer and Evan
