

It was super to receive the information and photos of your Cavalry revolver #113,906. This is a super gun, plus a great piece of Arizona History. I would suggest you write to the Charlotte Hall Museum in Prescott to get any information on the holster's maker "A.J.MASON". Then see if you can get any information from the Arizona Historical Society in Tucson on the brands and/or initials on the grips.



The revolver itself falls between #113,890 and #113,926 in our survey. It certainly shows care and care in restoration which I would estimate to have been done circa 1906-1910 since the hammer is of that vintage. Of course Arizona was still a territory until 1912, so this would tie in as to when the revolver was refinished at Colts. The "45 COLT" stamping was also added to the revolver when it was refinished, as well as the numbers "906" and the star on the front of the cylinder. The various star marks throughout the piece also indicate the factory refinish.

The holster itself is super! It reflects the fact that unlike Texas made holsters, the Arizona made holsters did not conform to any specific pattern, but were individualistic in design. I now have eleven Arizona made holsters in my collection, none of which conform to any specific design. Even holsters which were made by the same maker varried in design. The holster you have is super because of its extra wide skirt, probably only had one loop when made, but the upper loop was added to give more stability to the outfit. I'm sure you can get more history on its owner from the cattle brands etc. Once you establish some information about the brands, then you can go through some of the area directories circa 1906-1909, and try to establish the name of the owner..

Congratulations on your acquisition of Colt Single Action Revolver, U.S. Issue, serial number 113,906, with rare original holster marked "A.J. Mason/Maker/Prescott, Arizona Territory." Originally delivered to the U.S. government on December 17, 1884, this gun found its way out of government service and was carried in this rare Arizona Territory holster.

The same initials and cattle brands are cut into the original grips and the holster. During the period of the gun's use, it was factory refinished. It now retains about 70% of this old refinish. The grips retain good traces of the original government inspecor's cartouches on both sides despite the decoration of initials, brands and eleven notches or decorative cuts on the left.

The artwork on the grips was filled, possibly with beeswax when it was carved. This treatment is occasionally seen.

This is an exciting gun, both for its government service and its later, western (Arizona Territory) association. It's owner was thoughtful enough to decorate both gun and holster, thereby preserving their close association for us. You can well be proud of it.

Cal. Jackson has built a neat and substantial fence around his premises on Granite St. He is also pruning his fruit trees, of which he has quite an orchard on the large grounds that surround his home. This is one of the most inviting locations in town.
Judge C. A. Tweed, we understand from Judge Bush, will undoubtedly be here the last of this or the first of next week. The escape of James Hurst and Montgomery, will somewhat lessen the business of a special term of the District Court.
A PAMPHLET BUSINESS.—Mrs. Virginia Curtis who owns a valuable ranch adjoining Prescott, on the East, is a niece of Governor Peckham, of Sonora, Mexico, and owns ten leagues of land in that country, which she proposes to go and look after in a short time.
Eight wagons, loaded with larded hay, and drawn by forty-eight oxen, passed out down this canyon on their way to Hayes' old saw mill building on Leont street, where the hay will be stored to await a fair price. The owner's name we did not learn, but understood that fifty dollars per ton is the least he proposes to sell for.
R. J. Rutherford is erecting a building near the corner of Montezuma and Leroux streets, opposite the upper end of Lindsay's garden, when he is about to start into the dairy business. It seems to be a thirty by eight and dry place to do much in the milk line, though it is possible water may be had by digging deep enough.
Hon. C. A. Lake returned to-day by stage from San Francisco, having completed his arrangements for rebuilding the Constantia mill from near Ehrenberg to Bradshaw Estate. Parties wishing to engage in the sale and purchase business can have the Montezuma property on easy terms by applying to him, as he wishes to apply himself exclusively to mining and milling for the future.
John M. Durwin, undoubtedly the best miner in Yavapai County, is in town and has recorded the following claims with the County Recorder: Tomawanda ledge and Tomawanda ledge, Humboldt district. Both of these ledges are said to be very rich in silver and are so situated that they are just from the fact that they were located by a person who knows what to take up.

Since his return from the "Far West" he has been so often asked "What are the chief products of the Pacific Coast?" that he gives a cut of an Indian riding on a huge grass-hopper, as a complete answer. This, of course, is slender, even upon San Bernardino, where he spent his whole time while "out West."
Mural Masterson, Esq., arrived by stage yesterday from Tucson, looking many per cent. better, physically, than when he went away.
Ed. Peck got off at Charley Gentry's, in Peoples Valley, and went from there directly to his home in Walnut Grove. He will be here on Monday or Tuesday.
Masterson and Peck remained in Tucson a day or two longer than they intended, in order to be present and render any assistance possible to their friend Judge Howard, who had to submit to a severe surgical operation. The operation was performed by Dr. Hardy, successfully, the critical point was passed, and they concluded they could leave him with the assurance that he will soon be around and well.
McCRACKEN MIKE AND GREENWOOD.—Purd Fitzco came in from Greenwood yesterday, and from him we learn the following, encouraging facts with reference to mining in that country. The Greenwood mill has been changed from a dry to a wet crusher. During the time it was working the machinery, the average amount worked was about eight tons per day. Since the change has been made they are working from 20 to 30 tons per day. The daily yield of bullion during the month of January was \$1,000, and the 2d in February, \$1,500 per day. They have on the dump at the mill 350 tons of ore at present, and on the dump at the McCracken mine, ready to ship to the mill, the enormous amount of 50,000 tons, all of which will average 500 per ton, making an aggregate in value, less the expense of transportation and milling, of four millions eight hundred thousand dollars.

Pacific Coast items in the Indian appropriation bill as fixed by the Conference Committee and finally passed by both houses as follows: For the Arizona Apaches, 100,000; for the New Mexico Apaches, 100,000; for the incidental expenses of the tribes in California and Arizona, \$25,000 each. For incidental expenses in New Mexico, 20,000; for incidental expenses in Oregon, \$15,000; for incidental expenses in Nevada, Utah and in Washington Territories, 6,000 each.

Senate amendment, providing for continuing Hoopa Valley Agency, in California, is struck out; but an amendment providing for the Papago Agency, in Arizona, is added. The bill otherwise makes the usual provision for pay of Agents, etc., and fulfillment of treaty stipulations with Pacific Coast Indians.

Speaker Randall has telegraphed all members of the Forty-fifth Congress to be here rich fifth.

Washington, Feb. 26. Secretary Robinson says if the proposed resolution is made in appropriation, for the officers and men of the Navy service, that ships and crews will have to be sent home at once.

New York, Feb. 26. There is no longer a doubt that the plan placing General Grant at the head of a new Territory will be consummated.

Tucson, Arizona, Feb. 23. Contents here have served papers on territorial Auditor Vosburg, to test the validity of the Acts of the Ninth Legislative Assembly, with a view to keeping the job.

Yuma, Arizona, Feb. 13. Steamship Northwestern left San Francisco on the 10th. Expected at the mouth of the Colorado on the 20th. Connecting boat to Yuma on the twenty-seventh. Up to boats will leave Yuma about the eighth of March.

Florence, Final County, A. T., Feb. 23. day's stage from California brought Charley, Hanson, Gen. Anderson, R. M. Lips and Wm. Johnson, miners. They are indebted to Jos. Collingwood & Co., agents of Florence, for the above disbursements.

DEATH OF CONDUCTOR BROWN.—G. G. Brown, killed by a railroad accident on the desert between Indian Wells and Dos Palms, was one of the oldest conductors on the Coast, and has many friends now in Arizona. He was kind and accommodating to all, and a favorite with those who knew him best. His family lived many years in Sacramento and he had but recently removed them to Los Angeles where they now are.
